22	Missouri Gaming Commission financial analysts conducted
23	relicensing investigations which consisted of financial
24	reviews, feedback from Missouri suppliers, jurisdictional
25	inquiries, a review of disciplinary actions, litigation and

1	the key persons associated with the company.

3	included, but were not limited to, civil, criminal, financial
4	and general character inquiries that were made in the
5	jurisdictions where the applicants have lived, worked and
6	frequented.
7	The following applicants are being presented for your

9	Jonathon Tyler Johnson, IT Manager, River City Casino &
10	Hotel.
11	Eric Marlin Ochterbeck, Surveillance Manager,
12	IOC-Boonville, Incorporated, doing business as Isle of Capri
13	Casi no-Boonvi I I e.
14	And Norihito Nakatani, Director, Japan Cash Machine
15	Company, Li mi ted.
16	Investigative findings were provided to the Missouri
17	Gaming Commission staff for their review, and investigators
18	are available to answer any questions you might have.
19	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Mr. Hane?
20	COMMISSIONER HANE: Sergeant Holcomb, Jonathon Tyler
21	Johnson, IT Manager at River City Casino-St. Louis since
22	December, 2020, so two years this month he's been IT Manager.
23	So after working in this position for 10 to 11 months
24	operating on his previous Level II technical support analyst
25	license, then Penn Entertainment sends us his application for

1	SERGEANT MASTERS: IT Manager, yes.
2	COMMISSIONER HANE: Okay, has
3	SERGEANT MASTERS: But he had somebody above him, and
4	when his boss got promoted to a regional position, then he
5	became the senior IT person on the property, which triggered
6	his licensing status.
7	COMMISSIONER HANE: Was that in December of 2020?
8	SERGEANT MASTERS: No, it was in '21.
9	COMMISSIONER HANE: January of '21?
10	SERGEANT MASTERS: Correct.
11	COMMISSIONER HANE: That's when his boss got promoted
12	by PENN and moved?
13	SERGEANT MASTERS: Right.
14	COMMISSIONER HANE: Okay.
15	SERGEANT MASTERS: Then the MGC contacted River City
16	saying that he needed a license in February of right.
17	COMMISSIONER HANE: Okay, we contacted them in February
18	after he got promoted in January.
19	SERGEANT MASTERS: Yes.
20	COMMISSIONER HANE: And they made application, they
21	sent in an application in August?
22	SERGEANT MASTERS: The application was dated in May.
23	He was gathering his information. He had a Level II that
24	whole time for his
25	COMMISSIONER HANE: But needed a Level I?

1	SERGEANT MASTERS: So we needed additional information
2	to continue. I interviewed Mr. Johnson back on June 23 in the
3	summer, and that's when we found out in my investigation that
4	he purchased a new home, so I got with Cheryl Bonner and we
5	had to request additional information before the investigation
6	was complete.
7	COMMISSIONER HANE: But you interviewed him in June of
8	this year?
9	SERGEANT MASTERS: Correct.
10	COMMISSIONER HANE: Of '22?
11	SERGEANT MASTERS: Correct.
12	COMMISSIONER HANE: And we got the application August
13	of '21?
14	SERGEANT MASTERS: Correct.
15	COMMISSIONER HANE: Okay, thank you.
16	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Are you finished?
17	COMMISSIONER HANE: Yes, sir.
18	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Thank you. Any other questions for
19	Sergeant Holcomb or Masters? Seeing none, were you finished,
20	Sergeant?
21	SERGEANT HOLCOMB: Yes.
22	CHAIRMAN LEARA: All right, thank you, Sergeant. I
23	move for Resolution Number 22-070 be approved. Is there a
24	second?
25	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Second

1	CHAIRMAN LEARA: We have a second. Any other
2	di scussi on?
3	COMMISSIONER HANE: I just have a question. I don't
4	even know who it's to, but why does there seem to be such a
5	delay in receiving these applications? I mean if if you're
6	going to be promoted, I think that you are and once you meet
7	the qualifications, why don't I, you know, make an application
8	the month that you are appointed to that position and term you
9	as a whatever, interim IT Manager, until your Level I license
10	has been approved or a temporary is issued because I mean as
11	soon as we get the application, isn't it common that we issue
12	a temporary?
13	JUDGE RICHARDSON: Are you ready?
14	COMMISSIONER HANE: Yeah.
15	JUDGE RICHARDSON: First of all, this has been a
16	continuing problem that is getting less and less. I will tell
17	you we have made a concerted effort over the last several
18	months and we've had discussion with the Commission with
19	regard to making sure that applications are timely, that they
20	are complete, and that no license of any kind gets issued, not
21	even a temporary, until those licenses are or those
22	applications are complete.
23	We will no longer send them down to the patrol for any
24	kind of a background unless the application is complete. We
25	have notified industry that that lax position that had been

1	taken over the last several years will no longer be tolerated.
2	They've heard that from us, they've heard that from the
3	Chairman in open meetings, so I can tell you this would be
4	after Mr. Johnson's application came in that there has been a
5	change in the way we do business.
6	It's as much in my opinion, it's as much on us, MGC
7	Staff, as it is the licensee to make sure that those
8	applications are received and that they are complete. I can
9	tell you, and I think Ms. McCarthy can tell you, that there is
10	a turnaround now in the timeliness and the completeness of
11	those applications. So it is getting better, way better than
12	it was.
13	Secondly, with regard to Mr. Johnson, I don't believe
14	Mr. Johnson ever got a promotion. The guy ahead of him did
15	leave, but under our rules, we require a Level I license for
16	the senior person there. His job didn't change, really, if I
17	understand the facts correctly. He was a
18	COMMISSIONER HANE: He was a Technical Support Analyst.
19	JUDGE RICHARDSON: Well, I think he moved up a little
20	from that.
21	COMMISSIONER HANE: That's what he was licensed with.
22	JUDGE RICHARDSON: He held a Level II license, the guy
23	above him left, and because the guy above him left and there
24	was no one else put into that position, he became the senior
25	person there. And under our rules, the senior person there,

1	regardless of his title, has to have a Level I so that's
2	when
3	COMMISSIONER HANE: So he became
4	JUDGE RICHARDSON: By default, he became the senior.
5	COMMISSIONER HANE: By osmosis. He was just there.
6	JUDGE RICHARDSON: And I hope they're adequately
7	compensating him for those additional duties, but that's
8	between them and him. But by default, he became the senior
9	person there; and when we discovered that, that's when we
10	reached out to the casino and said, "Hey, he needs to have a
11	Level I license," and that's when that process started.
12	COMMISSIONER HANE: When we did that our guys did
13	that in February?
14	JUDGE RICHARDSON: Yes.
15	COMMISSIONER HANE: And then but we didn't get an
16	application until, what did you say, May?
17	JUDGE RICHARDSON: Until May. It was not complete, so
18	there was back and forth, back and forth.
19	COMMISSIONER HANE: Back and forth until basically it
20	was finally completed in August; right?
21	JUDGE RICHARDSON: I believe that is correct. Yes, we
22	gave him a temporary in August.
23	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Was it considered a complete license
24	in August or in May? I mean a complete application.
25	JUDGE RICHARDSON: In August.

1	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Okay.
2	COMMISSIONER HANE: Okay, thank you.
3	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Any other questions? Seeing none, I

8	Gaming, and you mentioned them with GLI.
9	CORPORAL DOZA: I would stand to be corrected. I was
10	going by a list on that.
11	CHAIRMAN LEARA: I don't mind being wrong, I just hope
12	the minutes reflect accurately that Mr. Yamaguchi is with
13	JUDGE RICHARDSON: Konami Gaming.

20	Thank you, Judge. And then I don't know if this matters, in
21	the very first background investigation, Bonnie Susan Biumi,
22	did I say that right?
23	CORPORAL DOZA: That's correct.
24	CHAIRMAN LEARA: But it was not done by you, it was
25	done by Sergeant Coulson. It refers to I believe her I

1	don't know as "Mr." in the first paragraph of the
2	introduction. I mean that's a small thing, but if we could
3	correct that also, if it needs to be corrected, I don't know.
4	Is it a lady?
5	SERGEANT COULSON: Yes, it's a lady.
6	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Okay, that's what I'm asking. So
7	we'll correct that in addition if we could. Well, and that's
8	why I tried to delicately maneuver through that, not trying to
9	be cheeky. Did you have any comments, Mr. Hane?

CHAIRMAN LEARA: Next item on the agenda, Consideration of Disciplinary Actions. Mr. Grewach, you have the floor.

MR. GREWACH: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, Commissioners. Under Tab E we have a Preliminary Order of Discipline directed at River City Casino for activities that occurred in their count room. The preliminary order alleges violations of Minimum Internal Control Standard G-4.06 which prohibits any supplies or equipment that are not related to the count process being in the count room, also Minimum Internal Control Standard G-4.11 which prohibits pocketbooks or similar containers unless they are transparent, and Minimum Internal Control Standard G-4.12 allows nontransparent containers as long as they are not placed within five feet of any currency in the room.

On January 10, 2022, an MGC agent spoke with the casino compliance manager concerning the microwave, refrigerator and humidifier in the count room, indicating that they were not directly related to the count and also told her and complained about the music playing so loudly in the count room that the surveillance audio could not be heard.

On January 12, 2022, there was a nontransparent beverage container directly next to funds in the count room.

On January 14, 2022, there were four bags with snacks I eaning against the cash counting machine. At that point in time now, they have removed the refrigerator and the microwave

but not the dehumidifier, which later they have argued that is related to the count process because it's necessary to keep the bills and tickets from sticking together.

On January 20, 2022, the Commission agent observed a hanging file folder with puzzles and books on the wall, a nontransparent beverage container next to the cash counting machine. In addition, one of the count team members broadcast a 37-minute long live video on FaceTime which showed the entire count room and the contents of that.

The Discipline Review Board recommended a fine of \$5,000. In the company's response to the 14-day letter, they did not contest the fine. They outlined some remedial measures such as removing the microwave and refrigerator and again indicated that they believed the humidifier was directly related to the count process for the reasons I stated previously.

They cited staffing issues. They asserted that they believe that 4.06 and 4.02, the one that prohibits equipment and supplies not related to the count process, and 4.12 which implies that nontransparent containers can be allowed in a room as long as they're kept within five feet from the funds. However, in this case the nontransparent containers that were found on these dates were next to the funds on each of the three occasions mentioned.

Discipline directed at Mark Twain Casino for repeat audit finding. It involves a process in which the cage cashiers when they close out their window total the tickets and check those totals to the system-generated report to make sure that they are accurate. Then the next step is then the cage cashier brings the report and the physical tickets to the main bank cashier.

Under the rule, the main bank cashier is then required to either compare the physical tickets to the system report to confirm that both the value and the dollar amount of the tickets match the report or to total the tickets herself independently with an adding machine and compare that adding machine tape to the system report.

There's a finding in the audit on a prior audit for the time period of May 2017 through April of 2019 that cited the main banker for failing to make the required reconciliation.

Instead, the main banker only compared the adding machine tape prepared by the cage cashier with the total report as opposed to totaling the tickets herself independently.

In this audit covering the period from March 2019 to September 2021, we found the same violation. A main bank cashier just compared the number of tickets to the number of tickets on the report and did not compare the total amount of those tickets as required by rule.

The Discipline Review Board recommended a fine of

\$2,500. In the 14-day letter response the casino did not contest the violation or the fine. They outlined remedial measures they had taken that sent two different memos to the main bank cashiers, and internally they also directed their surveillance department to observe the main bank cashiers when performing these duties. And the followup also performed by the MGC recently found in the physical observations that the problem had been corrected. DRB voted to keep the recommendation at the \$2,500 fine.

I was more concerned other than the violation of when reading the CSR, and I understand most of these CSRs were probably written 20-some years ago, it states that the adding machine tape -- I don't know when the last time I bought a roll of paper for adding machine tape -- but certainly isn't the technology -- or is it required to have

Consideration of Rulemaking. Mr. Grewach?

MR. GREWACH: Thank you. Mr. Chairman, under Tab G we have a proposed amendment to Chapter W of the Minimum Internal Controls relating to hybrid table games. A hybrid table game, as you may know, is a game where there's a live dealer but no chips are involved, and the patrons sit at terminals and place their wagers and cash out their winnings at that terminal.

When the rule was originally written, because it is the hybrid between some rules of the electronic gaming devices apply, some table games rules apply, the original draft that we are in the process of amending here incorporated by reference several different other chapters of the Minimum Internal Controls and specific sections in those chapters.

During the cashless rewrite, we amended some of the chapters and sections that are referred to in the current draft of Chapter W, and this amendment is to clean up and correct those references, including a reference to how AGR formula is calculated and of how we account for dealer tips.

We received Governor approval to proceed with this yesterday. The public comment period will begin on January 17, 2023, for 30 days. There will be a public hearing on February 17, 2023. The rules, with any comments or proposed changes, will come back to you at your March 29, 2023 meeting and, if approved by you at that point in time, will become effective on July 30, 2023.

6	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: I think one of them told us, at
7	least informed me that they were preparing in their
8	construction work. I thought maybe it was the Bally's or
9	whatever. Anyway, that's I will change my vote to approve
10	but it's always been a point of contention with me when we
11	start delving into this chapter of the CSR how this is
12	eventually going to work out and affect the industry as a
13	whole. So that's my point. I'm done.
14	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Call the roll.
15	MS. FRANKS: Commissioner Conway?
16	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Approved.
17	MS. FRANKS: Commissioner Hane?
18	COMMISSIONER HANE: Approved.
19	MS. FRANKS: By your vote, you've adopted Resolution
20	Number 22-072.
21	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Next item on the agenda, Final Orders
22	of Rulemaking. Mr. Grewach?
23	MR. GREWACH: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. We have three
24	Final Orders of Rulemaking. All three clarify the purpose
25	statements in the rule. Rule 9.030 also clarifies that the

1	Minimum Internal Control Standards are established by
2	individual regulations in Chapter 9. Originally, all the
3	Minimum Internal Control Standards were in one CSR. Since
4	that language that you're looking at that we're changing, we
5	then broke them down into different specific CSR chapters in
6	Chapter 9.
7	We received the Governor's approval to proceed with the
8	amendments on June 3, 2022. You approved the proposed
9	amendments at your August 30, 2022 meeting. There was a
10	30-day public comment period beginning October 3. There was a
11	public hearing on November 3, 2022, and no comments were
12	recei ved.
13	We received approval from the Governor's office to
14	proceed with these Final Orders of Rulemaking on November 9,
15	2022. If you approve these, they become effective on
16	March 30, 2023.
17	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Any questions for Mr. Grewach? I move
18	for the approval of Resolution Number 22-073. Is there a
19	second?
20	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Second.
21	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Second, Mr. Conway. Any other
22	discussion? Seeing none, Angie, call the roll.

1	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Approved.
2	MS. FRANKS: Commissioner Hane?

4	MS. FRANKS: By your vote, you've adopted Resolution
5	Number 22-073.
6	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Next item on the agenda, Consideration
7	of Waiver of Institutional Investors. Mr. Grewach?
8	MR. GREWACH: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Under Tab I we
9	have a Request for Renewal of Institutional Investor Waiver
10	from Royce & Associates, LP. The original waiver was granted
11	in December of 2020. The company is a hedge fund that is
12	registered with the SEC as an investment advisor. They hold
13	10.5 billion dollars in assets under management, and they own
14	8.75 interest in Century Casinos, Incorporated.
15	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Any questions? Now's your chance.
16	Okay, any other questions for Mr. Grewach? Seeing none, I
17	move for the approval of Resolution Number 22-074. Is there a
18	second?
19	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Second.
20	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Mr. Conway seconds. Any other
21	discussion? Seeing none, Angie, call the roll.
22	MS. FRANKS: Chairman Leara?
23	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Approved.
24	MS. FRANKS: Commissioner Conway?
25	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Approved.

1	MS. FRANKS: Commissioner Hane?
2	COMMISSIONER HANE: Approved.
3	MS. FRANKS: By your vote, you've adopted Resolution
4	Number 22-074.
5	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Next item on the agenda, Consideration
6	of Delegation of Authority to the Chair. Mr. Grewach?
7	MR. GREWACH: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. This resolution
8	would delegate to the Chairman the authority to extend any
9	existing license for up to 60 days pursuant to Rule 1.020(4).
10	That rule specifically requires the authorization to expire
11	one year from the passage of the last year's resolution, so
12	this is something annually we will place on the December
13	agenda. If the Chairman does exercise this authority to
14	extend a license, then it comes before the full Commission for
15	ratification at its next regular meeting.
16	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Any questions for Mr. Grewach? I have
17	one.
18	MR. GREWACH: Yes?
19	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Is there a reason that we renew this
20	on an annual basis? And I recall this, do we have any other
21	delegation of authority like this that we renew annually?
22	MR. GREWACH: Not that I'm aware of.
23	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Is there a reason why we don't just
24	move to have this put in the CSR?
25	MR. GREWACH: It would take a rule change, but I don't

1	know that there would be
2	CHAIRMAN LEARA: There's no reason why not to?
3	MR. GREWACH: I don't know the rationale why that
4	one-year limit was originally placed.
5	CHAIRMAN LEARA: That's not a policy that's is that
6	one of our policies or is it
7	MR. GREWACH: That's actually in the regulation.
8	JUDGE RICHARDSON: In the CSR, so it could be amended.
9	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Okay. I don't mind going through this
10	motion, but if it's something that we just approve every year,
11	why not?
12	MR. GREWACH: Right.
13	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Something to consider. All right, I
14	move for the approval of Resolution Number 22-075. Is there a
15	second? I might have to Lean on someone here.
16	COMMISSIONER HANE: Second.
17	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Second, Mr. Hane. Any discussion?
18	Seeing none, thank you, please call the roll.

3	of Relicensure of Bingo Manufacturers and Suppliers. Sergeant
4	Coulson, you have the floor.
5	SERGEANT COULSON: Mr. Chairman and Commissioners,
6	today I'm presenting several companies for relicensure as a
7	supplier or manufacturer of bingo products in the State of
8	Missouri. All bingo supplier and manufacturer licenses are
9	issued for the calendar year and expire on December 31 of each
10	year.
11	The relicensure of both manufacturers and suppliers
12	includes, but is not limited to, a review of federal and state
13	tax checks, open source checks, civil litigation checks, as
14	well as various criminal checks on each company's key persons.
15	The following companies have applied for relicensure of
16	their manufacturer's license.
17	Arrow International, Incorporated.
18	Pollard Games, Incorporated, doing business as American
19	Games.
20	VKGS, LLC.
21	The following company has applied for relicensure of
22	their supplier's license.
23	All American Bingo, Incorporated.
24	Thank you.
25	CHAIRMAN LEARA: All right, any questions for the

1	sergeant? I have one. Sergeant Coulson, I see on the I
2	guess this is a renewal report no criminal or civil
3	litigation that was undisclosed or anything like that, but l
4	don't see any previous disciplinary actions of those three
5	applicants. Is that considered and
6	SERGEANT COULSON: That's not considered. That was
7	nothing that we discussed about putting in the report.
8	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Okay. Judge, your thoughts?
9	JUDGE RICHARDSON: I know we did that for the first
10	time on some of the others.
11	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Yes.
12	JUDGE RICHARDSON: And quite frankly, Mr. Chairman,
13	prior to this meeting right here, you all had not received a
14	summary report of any kind. I did think that it was prudent
15	for you to at least have a light background summary report fo
16	the bingo manufacturers and suppliers, so that is something
17	new for you. We will add any prior disciplinary actions to
18	the next report.
19	I apologize that wasn't done here, but I bet I know
20	somebody who knows. So, Barb Whittle? As you know, Barb is
21	our in-house expert and manager of the bingo section, so any
22	prior disciplines?
23	MS. WHITTLE: Good morning. Barbara Whittle,
24	Charitable Games Manager. When the applications for
25	relicensure come in, they come to me first and then when

1	they're complete, I take them downstairs. And if anything was
2	needed to be noted, I would let them know at that time. They
3	are audited on an ongoing basis just like all of the other
4	bingo licensees, and there are no disciplines or audit
5	findings pending for any of these companies at this time.
6	CHAIRMAN LEARA: That's fine. Do we need to have I
7	think if it applies to the others that we get that
8	information, I think that we should incorporate that into
9	these reports.
10	MS. WHITTLE: It can be certainly be incorporated into
11	the report. Like the Judge said, this is the first go around
12	for these, and of course we can add that going forward.
13	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Thank you.
14	COMMISSIONER HANE: Just note that there's nothing
15	pendi ng
16	MS. WHITTLE: There's nothing pending, sure.
17	COMMISSIONER HANE: Or no history, nothing pending.
18	CHAIRMAN LEARA: We don't know about the history of
19	nothing pending, but going forward, we will. Mr. Conway?
20	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: I do have one question. These
21	manufacturers of bingo products solely, are they also the
22	manufacturers of the pull tabs?
23	MS. WHITTLE: So the first two that were listed do both
24	bingo paper and pull tabs. VKGS provides the electronic bingo
25	monitoring devices and oversees that system. So yes, they do

1	pull tabs and bingo paper, not exclusively; I mean they do
2	other things, but in our state, that's what they're licensed
3	for.
4	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Is that the electronic pull tabs
5	al so?
6	MS. WHITTLE: No, we don't license electronic pull
7	tabs.
8	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: That's what I thought. Okay,
9	thank you.
10	MS. WHITTLE: Uh-huh.
11	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Thanks, Barb.
12	MS. WHITTLE: Thank you.
13	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Okay, let's knock this one out. So I
