CHAIRMAN LEARA: We'11 call the meeting of the Missouri Gaming Commission to order. Angie, call the roll.

MS. FRANKS: Chairman Leara?
CHAIRMAN LEARA: Present.
MS. FRANKS: Commissioner Conway?
COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Present.
MS. FRANKS: Commissioner Hane?
COMMISSIONER HANE: Present.
MS. FRANKS: Commissioner Zimmerman?

CHAIRMAN LEARA: A11 right, we have a quorum. First item on the agenda is Team Member Recognition. Judge?

JUDGE RICHARDSON: We don't have a recognition like we normally do on a day like today for years of service or anything like that, but all good administrative professionals will remind you when it is Administrative Professionals' Day; so I have been reminded that today is Administrative Professionals Day and for all of you managers and supervisors out there that forgot, I just helped you out.

So I'm not going to single them out at the risk of maybe forgetting somebody, but I just want the Commission and all of you in the audience to know that we do have a number of administrative professionals that work for the missouri Gaming Commission. We are very, very grateful for the work that they
do.
I won't embarrass Angie by calling her out. She is my administrative professional, but there are many others; and anyway, we just want to acknowledge the work that they do, thank them and hope that you all appreciate the work that they do as well. Thank you, Chairman.

MS. FRANKS: By your vote, you've adopted the minutes of the March 29, 2023 meeting.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: Next item on the agenda, Consideration of Relicensure, Caesars Entertainment, Incorporated, Class A. we will have a presentation by Tim Lambert from Caesars. Gentleman, you have the floor when you're ready.

MR. LAMBERT: Good morning, Mr. Chairman and Commissioners, Judge Richardson and staff. I am Tim Lambert, L-A-M-B-E-R-T, Senior Vice President and Assistant General Counsel at Caesars. Thank you for the opportunity to be here today to present Caesars Entertainment's request for renewal of our Class A license as well as the licenses of our Key Business Entities, Caesars Holdings, Inc., Caesars Growth Partners, LLC, Caesars Resort Collection, LLC, and Isle of Capri Casinos, LLC.

I have just a very brief presentation for you today and will do my best to answer any questions that you might have.

E1 Dorado Resorts was originally licensed in Missouri in April of 2017 as part of El Dorado's acquisition of Isle of Capri Casinos. Subsequently, as you will recall, El Dorado Resorts and Caesars Entertainment merged in July of 2020 following the Commission's approval of that transaction. The combined company now owns, operates, or manages over 50 casinos countrywide, including three beautiful properties here in Missouri.

So you'11 see in the map here, it kind of demonstrates Caesars' broad geographically diverse footprint. This geographic diversity helped us have a very strong year in 2022, and 2023 has likewise started off very strong for the company. We employ approximately 49,000 employees. Of those 49,000, approximately 1,500 are employed right here in Missouri.

So this next slide is one that we're very proud of. Caesars' Code of Commitment is focused on what we call People, Planet, Play. We commit to supporting the wellbeing of people that is our guests, our team members and our communities. we commit to taking care of the world through initiatives intended to reduce our environmental footprint, and we commit to creating memorable experiences for our guests.

Caesars has contributed 123 million dollars in the last
two years through community investment and our Caesars Foundation. We were voted last year among the best places to work for both disabled and LGBTQ+ team members. And the leader of all this, Caesars Entertainment's corporate responsibility leader, is actually Missouri's very own Heather Rapp, who offices at our Isle of Capri in Boonville.

I mentioned previously that one of our commitments is to support the wellbeing of our guests. An important way that Caesars does this is through our responsible gaming initiatives. We're very proud to have been the first casino company to offer nationwide self-exclusion. We created the first national helpline for problem gaming. We were the first with specially trained responsible gaming ambassadors who are located at each one of our properties.

And now we've further expanded our commitment to responsible gaming by implementing the industry's most expansive universal exclusion policy, so when someone excludes him or herself from one gaming offering, they will be excluded from every gaming platform that Caesars offers. Further, we have adopted an enhanced 21-plus gaming policy that will limit Caesars Rewards participation to those who are 21 and over and also, where allowed by law, will limit our gaming offerings to those who are 21 and over as well.

Caesars is very proud of our three Missouri properties. We have had a continuous presence in Missouri since the
opening of Harrah's in North Kansas City all the way back in 1994. Our three properties employ over 1,500 fantastic team members, many of whom were not even born when Harrah's was first opened; which saying it out loud is more depressing than I can say.

But I'm excited to say that Caesars continues to invest in Missouri at each of our three properties. We've invested over 55 million dollars since our last relicensure with projects such as our addition of a Brew Brothers Restaurant in Boonville, a Gordon Ramsey Steak in Kansas City, and of course our complete rebrand at the St. Louis property, The Horseshoe.
we're continuing our investment in Missouri, committing to significant hote1 renovation at Harrah's Kansas City and we're in the design phase for a potential new Brew Brothers Restaurant in Kansas City as wel1, so we're very excited about that.

And that is really it for my big presentation, other than I guess the most important part, which is to thank the Commission for your consideration of our request today; and I'd like to express Caesars' gratitude to Commission staff and the investigators with their diligence and professionalism in connection with our relicensing process.

So with that, I respectfully request renewal of the Class A license of Caesars Entertainment and Key Business Entities.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: Any questions for Mr. Lambert?
Mr. Hane?
COMMISSIONER HANE: I was curious about the plans, the redevelopment of the New York property in Times Square and your particular partnership with Mr. Shawn Carter?

MR. LAMBERT: Yeah, so we have -- first of all, I think it's important to say that it's a -- right now we have entered into a nonbinding letter of intent, so there's no -- the only commitments that the parties have -- and the parties, by the way, are S. Carter Enterprises, which is related to Mr. Carter, and SL Green, a real estate development company in New York.

The letter of intent is not binding. We're pursuing this license in New York. We are continuing our due diligence on our partners. It's an ongoing process, and in fact $I$ understand our compliance committee is meeting this week in Nevada to discuss further diligence of this; but at this point there is nothing binding, so we're continuing that diligence. We'11 obviously keep the Commission apprised if it looks like this relationship is going to progress to a point where there would be a binding agreement, but at this point there is not.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: Commissioner Zimmerman?
COMMISSIONER ZIMMERMAN: Actually, Mr. Chairman, that was my question as well, was about that letter of intent. I know that the latest information in our packet was in March,
and so I just didn't know if there had been any further progress since then. So same question.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: Mr. Conway?
COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Thank you for being here. We appreciate your efforts in missouri. I think the one question I have is what do you foresee in the future for the st. Louis property? what plans -- I mean I know you have plans to undertake remarketing and rebranding. Do you think it has a successful future in your eyes in the upcoming years?

MR. LAMBERT: Absolutely. We have high expectations for the St. Louis property, perhaps somewhat to Brian Marsh's chagrin; but expectations are high and we're very happy, you know, with the progress that we're making there. We do have some challenges there that we are dealing with; but yes, we do have high expectations for that property going forward as far as, you know, details about that. And, you know, Brian is here today if you have specific questions about the property.

COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Nothing really specific, I just was kind of interested in how -- if it does expand, the base expands, and I guess on a side note the question is do you feel like you're getting the cooperative effort from the municipal facilities and individuals down there to help you continue your success?
mR. LAMBERT: we certainly have challenges at the property. We have had several meetings with the local
municipality to try to assist with some of those challenges. We have a very good relationship with the mayor and staff, and so we're encouraged and hopeful that we'11 be able to work together to resolve some of those issues. And so we are optimistic that we'11 be able to make progress there.

COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: Commissioner Hane?
COMMISSIONER HANE: Well, okay, back to Mr. Carter. You have a nonbinding letter of intent, okay. Well, a letter of intent, there is some intention for down the road a binding agreement?

MR. LAMBERT: There is the potential for that. At this point the only things that the letter of intent commit the parties to is basically an obligation to work together towards the potential acquisition of this license. There is a time limit to the letter of intent. There is nothing that requires the parties to stay together in the joint venture, you know, going forward.

The only other I guess binding part of the letter of intent is exclusivity where the parties would not work with others as they proceed towards this license application process, but otherwise there is nothing that requires the parties to stay together in this joint venture, post the term of the LOI.

COMMISSIONER HANE: Okay.
COMMISSIONER ZIMMERMAN: Mr. Chairman?
CHAIRMAN LEARA: Yes?
COMMISSIONER ZIMMERMAN: I guess I would follow up
then. You mention that there is a time frame on the letter of intent, and as I mentioned before, the latest update was in March. When does that expire? Do you know?

MR. LAMBERT: I believe it is December 31 of 2023. I can certainly confirm that.

COMMISSIONER ZIMMERMAN: I was just interested. Thank you.

MR. LAMBERT: Yeah, I'm pretty certain that that's the date.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: Any other questions for Mr. Lambert? I have one. I see that your only international -- or property outside the United States is in Canada; is that correct?

MR. LAMBERT: Correct, Caesars Windsor.
CHAIRMAN LEARA: Okay, thank you. Any other questions? Mr. Lambert, thank you.

MR. LAMBERT: Okay, thank you very much.
CHAIRMAN LEARA: Sergeant McTheeney, you have the floor.

SERGEANT MCTHEENEY: Good morning, Mr. Chairman and Commissioners. Before I give the presentation, I would confirm that December 31 of 2023 is the expiration of the LOI
or letter of intent.
CHAIRMAN LEARA: Thank you.
SERGEANT McTHEENEY: Caesars Entertainment, Incorporated is the ultimate parent company for three Missouri casinos which are Harrah's Kansas City, Isle of Capri-Boonville, Incorporated and Tropicana St. Louis, LLC. Caesars Entertainment, Incorporated submitted an application to the Missouri Gaming Commission on October 26, 2022 for renewal of the company's Class A Riverboat Gaming License. The license is scheduled to expire on April 30, 2023.

Caesars Entertainment, Incorporated currently has several Missouri Key Business Entities associated with its Class A license. The following four Key Business Entities are being presented for your consideration and are also set to expire on April 30, 2023.

Caesars Holdings, Incorporated.
Caesars Growth Partners, LLC.
Caesars Resort Collection, LLC.
Isle of Capri Casinos, LLC.
Missouri State Highway Patrol officers and Missouri Gaming Commission financial analysts conducted the relicensing investigations that consisted of a financial analysis, a review of disciplinary actions, litigation and business credit profiles and a review of key persons associated with each company.

Investigative findings were provided to the Missouri Gaming Commission staff for their review, and investigators would be glad to answer any questions you might have. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: Sergeant, I have one question. was the application submitted in a timely manner and complete for renewal?

SERGEANT Mctheeney: Yes, it was. That's correct.
CHAIRMAN LEARA: Thank you. Any other questions? Sergeant, thank you. I move for the approval of Resolution Number 23-025, the Class A Renewal. Is there a second?

COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Second.
CHAIRMAN LEARA: Second, Mr. Conway. Do we have any discussion on the motion? Seeing none, Angie, call the roll.

MS. FRANKS: Chairman Leara?
CHAIRMAN LEARA: Approved.
MS. FRANKS: Commissioner Conway?
COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Approved.
MS. FRANKS: Commissioner Hane?

Chairman leara: next item on the agenda is Resolution

Number 23-026, Key Business Entities as described in the list. Is there -- I will make a motion for the approval. Is there a second?

COMMISSIONER ZIMMERMAN: Second.
CHAIRMAN LEARA: Second. Any other discussion? Seeing none, Angie, call the roll.

MS. FRANKS: Chairman Leara?
CHAIRMAN LEARA: Approved.
MS. FRANKS: Commissioner Conway?
COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Approved.
MS. FRANKS: Commissioner Hane?
COMMISSIONER HANE: Approved.
MS. FRANKS: Commissioner Zimmerman?
COMMISSIONER ZIMMERMAN: Approved.
MS. FRANKS: By your vote, you've adopted Resolution Number 23-026.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: Next item on the agenda, Consideration of Tropicana St. Louis, LLC Petition to Transition to Nonfloating Facility. Mr. Marsh, you have the floor.

MR. MARSH: Good morning, Chairman Leara, Commissioners and staff. So today we are presenting a Petition for Approval to Transition to a Nonfloating Facility. We've got a very quick presentation to walk through in regards to that. I do want to point out one quick note on the petition that we do need to submit a change to. We've talked about four
containers carrying 500 gallons apiece. We actually need to resubmit that as 55-gallon containers totally, so we'11 get that change presented here.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: Okay. hold on a second, 55-gallon or 550-ga11on?

MR. MARSH: No, 55 gallons.
CHAIRMAN LEARA: 55-gallon containers?
MR. MARSH: Yes, sir.
JUDGE RICHARDSON: Mr. Marsh, your amendment will be a certain number of $55-$ gallon containers?

MR. MARSH: That's true.
JUDGE RICHARDSON: So I don't have to do the math, do you have that figure?

MR. MARSH: So it will equal 2,000.
JUDGE RICHARDSON: The reason I asked for the number, you can make a motion to amend your petition by interlineation if you had that figure.

MR. MARSH: Yeah, they're supposed to be 55s, so that would be 37 of them.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: It doesn't come out to exactly 2,000 ? MR. MARSH: It's going to be actually over.

JUDGE RICHARDSON: As long as it's over.
CHAIRMAN LEARA: That's acceptable, but I would like to clarify what it is now, and we can amend it.

MR. MARSH: Right now, it's four -- five 500-gallon
tanks.
CHAIRMAN LEARA: Is your plan to move to 55-gallon, I'm going to call them drums? That's typically what they --

MR. MARSH: Yes.
CHAIRMAN LEARA: Is that something you are firmly committed to doing?

MR. MARSH: As of today, yes. As of driving in this morning.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: As of today, all right. well, Judge?
JUDGE RICHARDSON: This is not something we had discussed, so I guess, Mr. Marsh, my concern might be if these are just regular 55-gallon drums, my concern would be how we could verify the water levels.

MR. MARSH: Yeah, that's correct; they're actually not metal drums, they're actually water drums, so they will be able -- we'11 be able to actually verify that each one is full all the way through, make sure of that.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: Mr. Conway has a wonderful idea, I think. And we'l1 let the Judge's expertise be -- let's hear what you think.

COMMISSIONER CONWAY: I think you could word it "containers in excess of 2,000 gallons," regardless of what the specifics are. I am still of the old school, I'm waiting for the casino that comes in and does a waterfall.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: So, Judge, what are your thoughts on
that? If we --
MR. MARSH: It's actually not specific in the way we can set this up, too. That's the other challenge with this direction.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: So let me ask you this, Brian.
MR. MARSH: Yes, sir?
CHAIRMAN LEARA: I'm looking at the engineer's specs here from $M$ and $B$ Marine Services. I don't see how those are containers. They're precast pedestal components.

MR. MARSH: So that's actually completely different. If you look at this portion of the presentation --

CHAIRMAN LEARA: Right.
MR. MARSH: -- if you look at each one of those dots, that's where we have to put a precast pedestal.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: For support?
MR. MARSH: For support, that's correct, so divers -yeah, two separate things.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: That's what that appeared to be, and I didn't see the containers in -- I did not see containers in our -- I don't know if that was the background investigation or if it was in some sort of summary report.

MR. MARSH: The engineering challenge, if I may, the engineering challenge was how we actually got the vessels into the bottom half of the floor itself, and that's why they switched engineers on me.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: I think what I would like to know is if you are firmly committed to moving to the 55-gallon -- the water drum concept versus tanks or containers?

MR. MARSH: We are. As of this morning, we are.
ChaIrman leara: so you're qualifying that, but -okay, let's put it this way. Judge, I don't know how to phrase this, but I am willing to amend this to "containers holding in excess of a cumulative 2,000 gallons." If something changes on that, though, I think you're going to need to come back to us.

MR. MARSH: Yeah, I got it.
JUDGE RICHARDSON: Mr. Chairman?
CHAIRMAN LEARA: Yes, Judge?
JUDGE RICHARDSON: With regard to Paragraph 9, Mr. Marsh, and I know you have your counsel here, Mr. Aiazzi, I would propose your amendment -- propose to you, you'11 have to be the one to propose the amendment -- but I suggest Number 9 would read, "The rigid tanks will consist of multiple containers bringing the total water held in the hulls of the casino barges under the gaming floor to in excess of 2,000 gallons."

MR. MARSH: Yes, ma'am.
COMMISSIONER HANE: Can we say just a minimum of 2,000 ?
CHAIRMAN LEARA: Let's take a step back here. Was your intention for these containers to be under the gaming floor?

MR. MARSH: Yes, sir.
CHAIRMAN LEARA: It was?
MR. MARSH: Yes.
CHAIRMAN LEARA: You have enough --
MR. MARSH: We11, if you remember, we have eight feet of space. It's a box in a box.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: Okay, so the Judge's --
JUDGE RICHARDSON: Let me read that again because I think Mr. Hane's suggestion was more accurate. Let's try this again.

MR. MARSH: The only addition to that, it's going to be rigid or a semi-rigid on that change.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: The drums would be rigid?
MR. MARSH: Yes.
JUDGE RICHARDSON: Let's try this. I've got the attorneys back here. Mr. Aiazzi, am I doing your job?

MR. AIAZZI: Absolutely. And you're doing it very we11.

MR. MARSH: It's so hard for me. You know what I deal with here.

JUDGE RICHARDSON: Let's try this. Paragraph Number 9, "The rigid or semi-rigid tanks will consist of multiple containers bringing the total water held in the hulls of the casino barges under the gaming floor to a minimum of 2,000 ga11ons."

MR. MARSH: Yes.
CHAIRMAN LEARA: Is that something you can comply with?
MR. MARSH: It is.
ChAIRMAN LEARA: Okay.
JUDGE RICHARDSON: Is that your amendment?
MR. MARSH: It is my amendment, thank you.
JUDGE RICHARDSON: Do you propose to amend your petition by interlineation?

MR. MARSH: We propose to amend our amendment on
Section 9 to read as "rigid or semi-rigid containers that will hold at a minimum of 2,000 gallons or more."

JUDGE RICHARDSON: As I stated it?
MR. MARSH: Yes, as you stated it.
CHAIRMAN LEARA: That's acceptable.
JUDGE RICHARDSON: Do you approve that?
Chairman leara: i will move to amend as stated by the Judge.

JUDGE RICHARDSON: Paragraph 9 of the petition.
CHAIRMAN LEARA: Paragraph 9.
MR. MARSH: Now we've got that out of the way --
ChAIRMAN LEARA: No, we haven't. I know you'd like to have this done, but you're in the hot seat right now. I will move. Is there a second?

COMMISSIONER HANE: Second.
Chairman leara: second, mr. Hane. Now, let's discuss.

It seems fine to me. They're having 2,000 gallons, it's -- I don't think it needs to be under the floor, but if that's where you want to put it, that's fine. Ms. Zimmerman?

COMMISSIONER ZIMMERMAN: Was this because of a height issue? You mentioned getting the four -- previously four rigid tanks that held 500 apiece, 500 gallons apiece. This became an engineering problem for you guys?

MR. MARSH: Yes, ma'am. When you think about the concrete that's used in constructing these, it's a very light concrete, so engineering wise we have to be very careful on the amount of and how large the holes are that we actually punch into the top part of the floor to get anything down to the bottom. So that's where the change came in.

COMMISSIONER ZIMMERMAN: It's a weight issue, too?
MR. MARSH: It's more of a structural issue with the actual concrete itself in the box.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: Kind of a different question here, and this has come to mind since all of this was passed a year ago. It doesn't have to be river water from the Mississippi; right? It's just water. Is that your understanding?

MR. MARSH: It does say "river water" in the statute. CHAIRMAN LEARA: I'm sorry, Judge?

JUDGE RICHARDSON: I believe a portion, which honestly a cup full.

MR. MARSH: So our river water actually -- or our water
actually does begin on the mississippi, so we're -- I believe we're okay there. It just doesn't actually physically come -if it pleases the Commission --

CHAIRMAN LEARA: You know, that's a good point. It does. That water comes from just a few blocks up the street there.

MR. MARSH: It does.
CHAIRMAN LEARA: All right, enough of the nonsense.
MR. MARSH: I'm actually glad we got that over with because that's been a debate for us as well.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: I will accept that. So we have a motion, we have a second, and we have discussion. Any other discussion on the motion?

JUDGE RICHARDSON: This is for the amendment only.
CHAIRMAN LEARA: Right. Seeing none, I move for the approval of the motion to amend Paragraph 9.

MS. FRANKS: Mr. Hane seconded.
CHAIRMAN LEARA: We have a second. All right, no other discussion, Angie, call the roll.

MS. FRANKS: Chairman Leara?
CHAIRMAN LEARA: Approved.
MS. FRANKS: Commissioner Conway?
COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Approved.
MS. FRANKS: Commissioner Hane?
COMMISSIONER HANE: Approved.

MS. FRANKS: Commissioner Zimmerman?
COMMISSIONER ZIMMERMAN: Approved.
MS. FRANKS: By your vote, you've adopted the amendment to the petition.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: Mr. Marsh, back to the original issue, your petition to transition, and you are in a proposal. Please?

MR. MARSH: Thank you. Yes, we are proposing that we will transition from a floating floor to a nonfloating floor. Just really quickly, the casino is built as a box and a box inside of it within the required distance from the Mississippi River. In order for us to do this, we actually have to send divers underneath between the top of the -- the bottom of the box and the floor itself, and we have to replace or place these structures which are the dry docking pedestals. They're concrete pedestals. They will actually go around each one of the tension rods and then be bolted together, and then there's a plate that will -- a shim plate that actually goes in on top.

Now, I actually wanted the water to be pulled out very quick7y and the engineers said that that can't happen, we actually have to drain the water very slowly, not because of the floor, but just to make sure that the outsides of the box stay structured. Once these are all in place, then we will begin pulling water out of the base itself.

Chairman leara: and then after the containers are filled with water, is there any maintenance or is that -- it's finished then?

MR. MARSH: It's finished at that point, so we have to make sure that we keep the water levels correct in our containers.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: I'm sorry, Sergeant. That's right, Masters. I am sorry. Sergeant Masters, what is d.o.o.?

SERGEANT MASTERS: It's a Slovenian limited liability company. It's an LLC. They converted to an LLC after the closure with VoteCo.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: I'm going to take a step back, go to Angie. Did we approve 031?

MS. FRANKS: We did.
CHAIRMAN LEARA: Okay, thank you. Sergeant Masters, you have the floor.

SERGEANT MASTERS: Mr. Chairman and Commissioners, Missouri State Highway Patrol investigators, along with MGC financial analysts, conducted the relicensing investigations of Interblock d.o.o. and Interblock USA, which are currently licensed suppliers in the State of Missouri. Both licenses are set to expire on April 30, 2023.

These investigations consisted of, but were not limited
to, financial reviews, gaming jurisdictional inquiries, feedback from Missouri casinos, and review of disciplinary actions, litigation, and business credit profiles, as well as a review of key persons associated with the companies.

The results of these investigations were provided to the MGC staff for their review, and investigating officers are present to answer any questions. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER ZIMMERMAN: okay, because of the conversation in the last resolution that we had about those pending and being held up, so will she come to us at a different time then?

SERGEANT MASTERS: Yes, she'11 be presented once I complete the investigation and the financial side is done.

COMMISSIONER ZIMMERMAN: Okay, thank you. I knew your interview with her was --

SERGEANT MASTERS: She's been with Interblock for awhile, but she -- once they closed the deal in June of 2022,
they made her a manager, which triggered her licensing because before it was just the CEO and the three directors.

CHAIRMAN LEARA: She's been vetted by us and approved.
COMMISSIONER ZIMMERMAN: Yes, previously. Thank you.

We are proposing to rescind this rule in its entirety because it is outdated, and no childcare facilities have been offered on property owned by Class A or Class B licensees for many years. Additionally, existing regulations of other agencies addressed that childcare facilities are properly licensed and regulated for health and safety; therefore, this rule is also duplicative.

This rule was identified for rescission by our five-year rule review team as part of our statutory obligation to review existing rules. We received approval from the Governor's office to proceed with this rescission on April 10, 2023. If you approve this rescission today, there will be a 30-day public comment period beginning June 1, 2023, and the rule will come back to you, along with any comments or suggested changes, at your August 30, 2023 meeting. If you give final approval at that time, the rescission will become effective on December 30, 2023.

Under Tab J, we have request for a waiver of institutional investor from Caledonia (Private) Investments Party Limited. The applicant is a hedge fund registered as an investment advisor with the SEC with its principal place of business in Sidney, Australia.

They have approximately 7.95 billion regulatory assets under management. They own 8.79 percent stock in Light \& Wonder, Inc., who is a Supplier Key Business Entity previously granted a waiver for institutional investor in January of 2021, which has expired.

I'd be happy to answer any questions you may have.
CHAIRMAN LEARA: So they are an Australian company, but they are licensed with the United States Securities Exchange Commission?

MS. WIEBERG: That's correct.
CHAIRMAN LEARA: okay, very good. Any questions for Kylee? You got off easy. Thank you. Any other discussion? Seeing none, I move for the approval of Resolution Number 23-035. Is there a second?
