2	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Good morning. I hope you all have
3	patience with me my first time. I'll call the August 30, 2023
4	Missouri Gaming Commission meeting to order. Angie, please
5	call the roll.
6	MS. FRANKS: Chairman Zimmerman?
7	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Present.
8	MS. FRANKS: Commissioner Conway?
9	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Present.
10	MS. FRANKS: Commissioner Hane?
11	COMMISSIONER HANE: Present.
12	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: We have a quorum. I'd like to
13	start the meeting this morning with a moment of silence for
14	Fairway Officer Jonah Oswald who was killed in the line of
15	duty on August 7.

17	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Thank you all. The first item of
18	business this morning is Commission Recognition of Chairman
19	Mike Leara. Mike, if you would join us up front and the
20	Commissioners join me down front.
21	I'd like to start this morning by saying a few words
22	about Chairman Leara, but first I'd like to recognize DPS
23	Director Sandy Karsten. Thank you so much for being here with
24	us this morning.
25	I joined the Commission in 2021, so I'm the newest

1	member that have had the unique opportunity to learn under the
2	leadership of Chairman Leara and with his guidance in some
3	somewhat difficult times. He has done an outstanding job
4	leading the Commission and leading the MGC as we move forward.
5	And I have some big shoes to fill. Well, they really are much
6	bigger than mine.
7	But I hope I will do you proud in leading the
8	Commission now that you've moved on to bigger and better
9	things. But I will share with the rest of the group what this
10	plaque says: Chairman Mike Leara, in recognition of your
11	outstanding service to the Missouri Gaming Commission and your
12	lifelong dedication to the citizens of the great State of
13	Missouri, your dates of service from August 14 of 2019 to
14	July 17 of 2023.
15	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Thank you.
16	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Would you like to say a few words?
17	CHAIRMAN LEARA: I enjoyed my time here, and I thank
18	the Governor for trusting me to carry the weight of the
19	Commission for four years, and I really did enjoy it and hope
20	it continues to run well. And I think that it will.
21	COMMISSIONER ZIMMERMAN: I hope you're right.
22	CHAIRMAN LEARA: Thank you.
23	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: The next item on our docket today
24	is Adoption of the Agenda, and I move we adopt today's agenda.

CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Thank you. Next we have

Consideration of Argosy Riverside Casino's approval to

transition to a Non-floating Facility. I'd like to call on

Mr. Lance George, the GM for Argosy, to make the presentation.

MR. GEORGE: Good morning, Commissioners. Lance George, Vice President and General Manager for Argosy Casino Riverside. We're here today to provide you folks with an update on Argosy's plan to transition to a non-floating facility. In front of you are four slides that we'll walk through that provide an overview of that plan.

At this point, I will turn it over to Greg Personelli, who is our Vice President of Non-Gaming Operations. Greg has done a lot of work getting the project to this point, and so I'll turn it over to Greg. We'll walk through the four slides and will answer any questions that you may have.

MR. PERSONELLI: Thank you. So I just wanted to kind of give you a glimpse, this is the way our platform looks right now with the casino floor. There's 105 cells that would have 139 intersection points, so our goal would be that at every intersection point, we'll put some blocks under there to support the floor and then we just bring the floor to rest. Currently the floor is kind of raised on water and air, kind of in a buoyancy kind of a situation, but this will allow us to bring it down.

Over here on the right -- I'm sorry, on the left --

this is what the cell looks like during construction. Every intersection point sits on about a four-foot pedestal and then there's a steel rod that goes up the middle right into the bottom of our casino floor.

On the right side up top, this is what is raised with water, so there's about a five-and-a-half inch gap between the pedestal and the intersection points. And then down below, we had our divers come out and do a sample block just to make sure that -- for sizing for what we'd have to complete. That was very successful.

We've worked with Lay Pitman, naval engineers, naval architects out of Florida, and what they've come up with for us is that we would do a 12 by 4-inch block, there will be two different sides, will either be 20-inch length or an 18-inch length, and then those blocks would be filled with concrete.

It will come delivered hollow, we'll fill them with concrete at the Argosy property itself by an outside company. That cement will be tested to 4,000 psi to make sure we have enough strength to hold the floor when it comes to rest.

And then down below here, it's a little bit hard to see, but this is where you see the pedestal coming up from the floor. The blocks would be inserted in there and then they'd be wrapped with a stainless steel wrapping to keep them in place, should any -- we don't think they're going anywhere, but should they want to go somewhere, they can't.

So we worked the Lay Pitman, naval architects. They did a feasibility study back in 2022 to say if the floor is capable of coming to rest. They worked up the plans for us. Their plans have been reviewed by Jeff Boyle for Code Serve. Northern Diving will be performing the install onto the casino floor. Upon approval, we'll get production started. We expect to have the blocks on property by the end of October to start being installed in November and then finish up in December.

Our goal will be to keep the water that's currently under the basin, there's over a million and a half gallons of water there right now. That water will stay in place, we'll continue to monitor that, if there's any evaporation or anything like that; but based on our calculations with that evaporation, it's going to take years to get us anywhere near 2,000 gallons of water, so that will stay in place.

So that's the plan. It seems pretty simple for us to do this, but it's got a lot of work to get to this point.

CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: It doesn't seem simple at all, actually. Well, that was going to be my question about the 2,000 gallons, and so obviously you've already answered that. Does anyone have any questions for Mr. George?

COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Thank you. Will making this a more steady foundation allow you for future expansion then? Is that part of the intended --

1	MR. PERSONELLI: So we would this would allow us
2	that ability to do so because once we bring it to kind of a
3	land-based facility, it would be a matter of, my
4	understanding, is that if we moved our turnstiles, and then
5	anything behind the turnstiles can be considered gaming space
6	at that point. That's not the original plan, but it's
7	something that we have talked about and took into
8	consideration.
9	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Okay, thank you.
10	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Any other questions? Seeing none,
11	thank you, gentlemen, very much.

2	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Next we have Consideration of
3	Licensure of Level I Key Applicants. Sergeant John Masters
4	will make a presentation. Sergeant Masters?
5	SERGEANT MASTERS: Thank you. Good morning, Chair
6	Zimmerman and Commissioners. Missouri State Highway Patrol
7	Investigators and MGC Financial Analysts conducted
8	comprehensive background investigations on Key and Level I
9	applicants.
10	The investigations included, but were not limited to,
11	criminal, financial, and general character inquiries which
12	were made in the jurisdictions where the applicants lived,
13	worked, and frequented.
14	The following applicants are being presented for your
15	consideration:

17	Manager, Ameristar Casino St. Charles.

1 Secil Watson, Director, Member of the Board, Everi 2 Holdings, Inc. Investigative findings were provided to the MGC Staff 4 for their review, and the investigators are present to answer 5 any questions you might have. 6 CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Sergeant Masters, I do have a 7 couple of questions about one of the applicants. Terry Brennan McCall, I noticed that on Page 2, which lists all the 8 9 applicant names and their expiration dates, on that page, on 10 Page 2, he shows an expiration date of 12-31 of '24, but then on Page 10 in his actual background packet, the expiration 11 12 date shows 2-28 of '25. I'm just wondering if there was a 13 reason that the dates were different on the cover page versus 14 in his actual background. 15 SERGEANT MASTERS: I'll refer to Sergeant McTheeney or Leann McCarthy with licensing. 16 17 CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: I'm sorry, ladies, it was Page 2 18 and Page 10 in his actual packet. 19 MR. McCALL: I can actually comment on that if you 20 like. I'm Terry McCall. 21 SERGEANT MASTERS: Mr. McCall is here. 22 MR. McCALL: Yeah, so the reason is I started on 23 December 29 and so I started filling out the packet on 24 December 29, right around that point in time, so that was put 25 on that page initially. So that's why that date exists and

1 then was finalized after all the. 2 CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: So then we feel pretty confident 3 that the actual expiration date is 2-28 of '25 then, okay. 4 Gentlemen, other questions? 5 COMMISSIONER HANE: I do. I noticed that in the financial information you're showing Mr. McCall with a 6 7 negative net worth. Is that concerning? SERGEANT MASTERS: This wasn't my case, so I'll let the 8 9 investigators that handled the case --10 CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Well, just to tag onto Commissioner Hane's question, I did notice the same and his 11 12 financial status showed a negative net worth of 26,000 and 13 there was no payment of taxes in '18, '19 and '20, but 14 ultimately a payment in '23. So again, was that a concern 15 based on his position? 16 MR. STEGEMAN: Sam Stegeman, financial analyst. I did 17 not find a concern. It's just a fact of limited assets with a 18 little bit more higher liability. In his new position he's 19 able to correct that, and we have a point of action to get 20 that corrected; but it's just a matter of having more 21 liabilities than assets. I did not find it as a concern. 22 CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: I don't know if either of the 23 other Commissioners noticed, same sort of issue on another one 24 of the applicants, a negative net worth, I believe Stacy 25 McGava also?

1	MR. STEGEMAN: Right.
2	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: And again, considering the
3	position of fairly key importance within the organization
4	MR. STEGEMAN: No concerns there at all.
5	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: No concern?
6	MR. STEGEMAN: Right. With McGava, the reason her
7	negative net worth was there is she is financially responsible
8	for a Parent Plus Loan, which is a student loan for her
9	daughter; so with that being on there, it caused the negative
10	net worth.
11	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: I did notice that it mentioned
12	student loans in the application. Any other questions?
13	Mr. Hane, you look like you want to ask something.
14	COMMISSIONER HANE: Well, I'm just a little puzzled.
15	Mr. McCall is showing basically a six-figure income, and
16	having a negative net worth is a little bit concerning to me.
17	MR. STEGEMAN: Well, there for two years, he was
18	unemployed; so with his new position, he's able to start
19	working on establishing that positive net worth.
20	COMMISSIONER HANE: So there's a plan in place?
21	MR. STEGEMAN: Right.
22	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Will you be monitoring that?
23	MR. STEGEMAN: I can, yes.
24	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: As part of his, you know, making
25	sure that his license stays current?

1	MR. STEGEMAN: Right. And of course it will be
2	reviewed when he's up for renewal in two years.
3	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Are you okay with that?
4	COMMISSIONER HANE: Yeah.
5	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Any other questions for either of
6	them? All right, seeing none, thank you, Sergeant Masters.
7	SERGEANT MASTERS: Thank you.
8	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: I move to adopt Resolution 23-053.

2	S-C-H-O-P-P-E. We have a number that come up for renewal each
3	month. In the month of July, the Commission, as you know,
4	does not have a Commission meeting. MGC staff thought we had
5	all of the July renewals done in June, but we missed
6	Mr. Schoppe.
7	He had applied, his renewal paperwork was in. We just
8	missed getting that before the Commission in a timely manner,
9	so we're requesting on your authority to extend Mr. Schoppe's
10	license through the end of August, and he is in fact on the
11	list for relicensure of Key Persons.

13	Judge? And just for the information of the other
14	Commissioners, the Judge made me aware of this when it
15	occurred and knew that it was just an oversight because of the
16	lack of a meeting in July. So I was aware that this was

Welcome, Sergeant Holcomb. 3 Thank you, Chair Zimmerman. 4 SERGEANT HOLCOMB: Good 5 morning, Commissioners. The Missouri Gaming Commission received renewal 6 7 applications from Gaming and Leisure Properties, Incorporated and GLP Capital, LP on February 14, 2023 and a renewal 8 9 application from Gold Merger Sub, LLC on June 28, 2023. 10 The applications were submitted in a timely manner, which allowed time for the investigations to be conducted. 11 12 Each company's Key Business Entity License expires on 13 August 31, 2023. 14 Missouri State Highway Patrol Investigators and 15 Missouri Gaming Commission Financial Analysts conducted 16 relicensing investigations consisting of a financial review, 17 feedback from Missouri casinos, jurisdictional inquiries, and 18 a review of disciplinary actions, litigations, and the key 19 persons associated with each company. 20 Investigative findings were provided to the Missouri 21 Gaming Commission Staff, and I'd be glad to answer any 22 questions you might have. 23 CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Not really a question so much, 24 Sergeant Holcomb, as just to verify, I saw in the packet that 25 GLPI and the subsidiaries are responsible for six properties

1	in Missouri, two on the Kansas City side and four on the St.
2	Louis side; is that correct?
3	SERGEANT HOLCOMB: Correct.
4	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Of the massive number of
5	properties that they're responsible for across the country; so
6	six in Missouri, I just wanted to verify that.
7	SERGEANT HOLCOMB: That is correct, ma'am.
8	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: All right. Other questions for
9	Sergeant Holcomb?
10	COMMISSIONER HANE: Just to make clear, they own the
11	actual land and the building?
12	SERGEANT HOLCOMB: The land is owned by GLPI. I
13	believe the building is as well, and then anything owned
14	inside of it is owned by the operating company.
15	COMMISSIONER HANE: Okay.
16	SERGEANT HOLCOMB: Which would
17	COMMISSIONER HANE: Okay, I thought the land, but I
18	wasn't sure about the building itself.
19	SERGEANT HOLCOMB: I believe the building is. I'll
20	confirm that and get back with you.
21	COMMISSIONER HANE: Thanks.
22	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Any questions, Mr. Conway?

CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Thank you. Next item on the agenda is Consideration of the Relicensure of Certain Suppliers and Key Business Entities. Sergeant Jason McTheeney will make the presentation on the United States Playing Card Company followed by Sergeant John Masters who will present on behalf of Gaming Partners International USA. Sergeant McTheeney, you have the floor.

SERGEANT McTHEENEY: Thank you, Chair Zimmerman. The United States Playing Card Company submitted an application to the Missouri Gaming Commission for renewal of its supplier license which is scheduled to expire on August 31, 2023.

Additionally, Brepols Group NV, Van Genechten NV, Cartamundi NV, and Carta Mundi Incorporated all submitted renewal applications for their Key Business Entity licenses that are scheduled to expire December 31, 2023.

Missouri State Highway Patrol Investigators and Missouri Gaming Commission Financial Analysts conducted relicensing investigations which consisted of financial review, feedback from Missouri casinos, jurisdictional inquiries, and a review of disciplinary actions, litigation, and the key people associated with the company.

The findings of these investigations were provided to the Missouri Gaming Commission Staff, and I'd be glad to answer any questions you might have. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: I just have a quick question about

1	the change in sort of the process. I know the Judge has
2	talked to us about combining all these investigations so that
3	they come due at the same time. Has this been beneficial to
4	you and your investigators, having all of these come up at the
5	same time instead of being sort of scattered across the year?
6	SERGEANT MCTHEENEY: Yes, absolutely.
7	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Much more beneficial to get them
8	all done at the same time since all of these businesses are
9	associated with each other? Is that we're all about making
10	it easier for you all, but is that also especially true with
11	some of those that are international such as some of the ones
12	that we had today?
13	SERGEANT MCTHEENEY: Correct, very much so.

17	23-058. Is there a second?

5	SERGEANT MCTHEENEY: They are both currently licensed.
6	Mr. Shigeta was just I believe he was renewed during 2023.
7	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Thank you. I noticed that you
8	mentioned at the end of your report that Mr. Matsumoto had
9	filed, and I just wasn't sure
10	SERGEANT MCTHEENEY: Yeah, he was appointed on May 1.
11	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Thank you. Other questions for
12	Sergeant Masters?
13	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: I have one question. When you
14	were explaining the process of the chip making, it says "overt
15	and covert security"?
16	SERGEANT MCTHEENEY: Yes.
17	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: What is that?
18	SERGEANT MCTHEENEY: It's like to the naked eye, you
19	can't see it.
20	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Is there a tracking on the chips
21	at any time?
22	SERGEANT MCTHEENEY: Yeah, the casino would do it and
23	take inventory.
24	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: I mean within the chip, like have
25	they developed something with microchips in the chips yet

2	SERGEANT MCTHEENEY: It's the the radio frequency is
3	all I know of.
4	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Okay. It's a brand new world
5	with chips, isn't it?
6	SERGEANT MCTHEENEY: Well, it's that way so they know
7	if one is off property or if they're trying to locate one.
8	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Right, thank you.
9	SERGEANT MCTHEENEY: Normally it's in the higher value
10	chips.
11	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Any other questions for Sergeant
12	Masters? Seeing none, thank you, Sergeant Masters. I
13	appreciate that. I move approval for Resolution 23-059. Is
14	there a second?
15	COMMISSIONER HANE: Second.
16	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Any further discussion? Angie,
17	would you call the roll?

1	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: I move approval for Resolution
2	23-060. Is there a second?
3	COMMISSIONER HANE: Second.
4	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Any further discussion? Angie,
5	would you call the roll?
6	MS. FRANKS: Chairman Zimmerman?
7	COMMISSIONER ZIMMERMAN: Approved.
8	MS. FRANKS: Commissioner Conway?
9	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Approved.
10	MS. FRANKS: Commissioner Hane?
11	COMMISSIONER HANE: Approved.
12	MS. FRANKS: By your vote, you've adopted Resolution
13	Number 23-060.
14	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Next item on the agenda is
15	Disciplinary Action for PNK, LLC. General Counsel Heather
16	Richenberger will make the presentation.
17	MS. RICHENBERGER: Thank you, Chairman Zimmerman,
18	Commissioner Conway, Commissioner Hane. Under Tab I, there is
19	a Preliminary Order of Discipline directed at PNK (River City)
20	LLC alleging violations of the Commission's Minimum Control
21	Standards, Chapter G, Chapter H, and Chapter U. The
22	preliminary order is based on recent compliance audit
23	conducted by the Commission's agents in which there were three
24	significant violations at the River City Casino.
25	The first of these violations is a repeat audit finding

involving the casino's activities which violate Chapter H, Section 14.07 and the Commission's Minimum Internal -- excuse me, which violate Chapter H, Section 14.07 of the Commission's Minimum Internal Control Standards.

This requires that any found cash chips, unclaimed credits or tickets less than \$10 shall be processed daily in the presence of the cage supervisor and one other cage employee. On August 22, August 23 and August 25 of 2022, violations of this standard are alleged to have occurred when funds from the casino's unclaimed property box was processed without the presence of a second casino cage employee.

These same violations were found in a prior MGC audit report issued on September 1 of 2020 and again in a followup audit report in February of 2021. The casino's response to the prior audit findings indicated it would retrain staff; however, this failed to resolve the issues and the violations continued.

The second on the violations is also a repeat audit finding involving the casino's activities which violate Chapter U, Section 4.05 of the Commission's Minimum Control Standards. This requires that manual adjustments to player reward credits to an individual patron's account be documented to include the patron's information, amount of the credit adjustment, and the explanation for the adjustment. A daily report is required from the system listing all the information

and adjustments to a player account for that day.

Additionally, the accounting department must conduct a weekly audit report of these adjustments for the purpose of assuring the legitimacy of the credit adjustments.

The current audit report shows that as of September 28, 2022, the casino's revenue audit was not conducting daily audit of the manual credit adjustments using a report from the system as is required.

This same violation was previously noted in the MGC audit reported issued on September 1 of 2020. In the casino's response to this prior audit report, it stated corporate IT had developed the necessary reports for compliance and that those reports had been implemented. Despite this original implementation, the reports were not being used and the violation continued.

The third violation alleges activities by the casino in violation of the casino count room procedures. The Commission's Minimum Control Standards as set forth in Chapter G in Section 7.11 and 7.13 require that the contents from each drop device shall be recorded prior to commingling the funds with funds from other devices. It is further required that when all assets have been counted, a count team member shall prepare a report in the count room listing the correct count for each asset and the correct grand total.

Observation for the gaming days of August 26 of 2022

and August 30 of 2022 showed that the casino did not follow the correct procedure for a BV count conducted in the count room. During the BV counts, contents of each drop device were not accurately recorded prior to commingling the funds with funds from other devices.

Additionally, there were three inaccurate grand totals in the count and BV count totals. During the interview with the count room manager on September 20 of 2022, he indicated the inaccurate count totals were caused by malfunction of the count room's MPS machine.

The Disciplinary Review Board has reviewed the three violations and recommended a total fine of \$10,000. In the company's response to the Commission's 14-day letter, it did not contest the audit findings or the fine. The company did outline remedial measures it has taken to address the issues. These include investment in new count equipment and maintenance of existing equipment and implementing new processes to ensure compliance with the Commission's Minimum Control Standards.

The Disciplinary Review Board considered the casino's response and maintains the \$10,000 fine recommendation.

Thank you. If there's any questions, I'd be happy to take those.

CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Thank you, Ms. Richenberger. I guess I would like to at least have a conversation with my

1	fellow Commissioners. I realize that \$10,000 is a
2	considerable amount of money, but I have really significant
3	concerns about the repeated findings of the audit and the
4	amount of effort that these audits create for MGC Staff, only
5	to find out that the same types of violations continue over
6	and over again and the apparent failure of River City to take
7	those findings seriously.
8	They were just fined \$15,000 for a violation in
9	February of this year which involved inappropriate behavior or
10	the part of casino staff, not necessarily an audit situation
11	in that case; but I feel very concerned that management
12	doesn't take these seriously, these violations, and would just
13	perhaps want to engage my fellow Commissioners in a
14	conversation about whether \$10,000 is an appropriate fine.
15	Any comments?
16	COMMISSIONER HANE: It is concerning that we have
17	repeat, repeat, repeat violations. And so the correction is
18	updating the counting machinery and additional staff training?
19	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Training of staff?
20	MS. RICHENBERGER: That is the response by the casino,
21	indicating they have replaced let me double check here
22	investment in new count equipment and maintenance of existing
23	equipment in the count room.
24	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: From a procedural standpoint, wher
25	would a followup audit be conducted to see if the changes that

1	specific dates? I mean if you would have gone into September,
2	you
3	MS. KEMPKER: We would have likely found more instances
4	because it was when the machine was malfunctioning that they
5	had to make these corrections and didn't carry it through to
6	the correct BV count.
7	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: How long did they have a
8	malfunctioning machine that allowed these errors to occur?
9	MS. KEMPKER: That, I am not sure of. They did have
10	maintenance conducted on these machines and they did buy a new
11	machine to replace the one that was causing the most trouble.
12	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Thank you.
13	MR. PEATE: I'd be happy to share. I'm the General
14	Manager at River City. I'd be happy to answer any questions
15	if you so are interested.
16	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Would you introduce yourself for
17	the record?
18	MR. PEATE: Thank you. My name is Steve Peate, I am
19	the General Manager at River City Casino, so a couple of
20	things that I'd like to clarify. We take audit findings
21	incredibly serious. Obviously, that's the reason I'm here
22	today. Our compliance director and compliance manager are
23	also here because of the importance of these kind of
24	situations.
25	The count room equipment machine malfunction was

frankly -- it didn't result in a loss, didn't result in a discrepancy related to the funds or anything paid. What our team did is, when the machine malfunctioned, they didn't stop the process and verify that money back to the specific can. They commingled those things, so the audit report, as far as the discrepancy of the findings and the gaming day dollars due was appropriate, and that's audited in three different ways.

So that money then goes to our main bank, and then our revenue audit team verifies that all of that money matches to our casino gaming system, while still an important process that our team needs to slow down and ensure.

So we did spend over \$200,000 on new equipment and repairing of equipment to make their jobs more efficient. And that was an unfortunate situation that our team got into, similar to the revenue audit reporting structure. With Covid, we lost some folks; and one of our managers unfortunately started to make some independent audits on how the reports were generated and he did not share that with the rest of the team upon his exiting the organization, so resulted in our team frankly just being naive to it.

So we have now specifically automated reports that are generated through our player tracking system that provides that detail now. So we take it incredibly serious. That's why we didn't argue the fines. We feel like it's our obligation we ensure we're in compliance. That's why we take

1	it very serious, we've done retraining with our teams.
2	And our revenue audit manager at the time excuse me,
3	our compliance manager at the time also went back and looked
4	at all the tapes related to the count room to find and
5	identify those opportunities as we move forward and has
6	continued to follow up.
7	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Okay, thank you, Mr. Peate. I
8	appreciate that.
9	MR. PEATE: Thank you.
10	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: I will move to approval
11	Disciplinary Action DC-23-040. Is there a second?
12	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Second.
13	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Any further discussion? Angie,
14	would you call the roll?
15	MS. FRANKS: Chairman Zimmerman?
16	COMMISSIONER ZIMMERMAN: Approved.
17	MS. FRANKS: Commissioner Conway?
18	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Approved.
19	MS. FRANKS: Commissioner Hane?
20	COMMISSIONER HANE: Approved.
21	MS. FRANKS: By your vote, you've adopted DC-23-040.
22	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Thank you, Ms. Richenberger. I
23	appreciate that. Next disciplinary action is St. Louis Gaming
24	Ventures, LLC. Deputy General Counsel Nikki Evans will make
25	the presentation.

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MS. EVANS: Good morning Chair Zimmerman, Commissioners. Under Tab J, we have Preliminary Order of Discipline directed at St. Louis Gaming Ventures, LLC, who operates Hollywood Casino St. Louis, for alleged violations of 11 CSR 45-7.040, which states that every licensee shall conduct and record surveillance which allows clear, unobstructed views in all areas of the general casino floor with sufficient clarity to permit identification of all players, employees, patrons, and spectators, as well as alleged violations of the Commission's Minimum Internal Control Standard Chapter A, Section 3.03, which states that all short-term variances must be submitted via a detailed written report to the Jefferson City MGC office showing a specific need for the variance, including any proposed conditions and restrictions. The request must be approved in writing by MGC prior to implementation.

In this matter, the Commission gave approval to the casino to conduct cashless gaming demonstrations on electronic gaming devices, EGDs, and table games in September of 2022. The approval included the following conditions set forth in the casino's initial request.

The EGD and table games were to remain under constant surveillance coverage and the demonstration room would be restricted from patron access when not occupied by a licensed employee. The approval from the Commission also included the

condition that the EGD would be RAM cleared and assigned an asset number not found on the live system.

On September 26, 2022, EGD Coordinator Kelly Allen inspected the environment for the cashless gaming demonstrations. The inspection revealed that there was no dedicated surveillance coverage of the demonstration room that would meet the standards of regulation camera approval. Further, the door to the demonstration room which was accessible to the public was found to be unsecured. EGD Coordinator Allen also determined that the EGD had not been RAM cleared or assigned an asset number, all of which were conditions required pursuant to the Commission's approval letter.

The Disciplinary Review Board reviewed this case and recommended a \$5,000 fine. The casino did not contest the fine. In the response, the casino acknowledged the environment and noted that the gaming demonstration took place at later date with the following approval.

And I'd be happy to answer any questions that the Commissioners may have on this issue.

CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: I just have one question. I certainly understand the seriousness of leaving the EGD in the ultra-high limit room unsecured for almost 72 hours. Could you explain or did they explain the potential ramifications or loss with licensees having access to that room? Would they be

1	able to do anything to that machine or use that machine if
2	patrons were allowed to come and go since the door was
3	unlocked?
4	MS. EVANS: For that question I would like to defer to
5	Kelly Allen who is here today and is our Electronic Gaming
6	Device Coordinator.
7	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Thank you. Ms. Allen?
8	MS. ALLEN: Good morning, Chair Zimmerman,
9	Commissioners. Kelly Allen, EGD Coordinator. The game was
10	not hooked up to the system; however, they could have
11	potentially vended money and played that game and therefore
12	won jackpots because it was live.
13	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: There was not any loss, though, I
14	understand?
15	MS. ALLEN: There was not.
16	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Okay, but potentially there could
17	have been because the room was left unlocked for at least 72
18	hours
19	MS. ALLEN: Potentially, correct.
20	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: I think they were aware of.
21	Thank you.
22	MS. ALLEN: You're welcome.
23	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Any other questions? Mr. Conway?
24	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: I don't believe so.
25	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Okay, no additional questions for

1	Ms. Evans? Thank you, Ms. Evans. You might want to stay up,
2	I know you're up next as well.
3	MS. EVANS: I'll hang tight up here.
4	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: I move approval for Disciplinary
5	Action DC-23-041. Is there a second?
6	COMMISSIONER HANE: Second.
7	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Any further discussions? Angie,
8	would you call the roll?
9	MS. FRANKS: Chairman Zimmerman?
10	COMMISSIONER ZIMMERMAN: Approved.
11	MS. FRANKS: Commissioner Conway?
12	COMMISSIONER CONWAY: Approved.
13	MS. FRANKS: Commissioner Hane?
14	COMMISSIONER HANE: Approved.
15	MS. FRANKS: By your vote, you've adopted DC-23-041.
16	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Next is Disciplinary Action for
17	IOC-Boonville, Incorporated. Ms. Evans, you're up again.
18	MS. EVANS: Thank you. Under Tab K we have a
19	Preliminary Order of Discipline directed at Isle of Capri
20	Boonville for alleged violations of the Commission's Minimum
21	Internal Control Standards and the Casino's Internal Control
22	System, Chapter J, Section 1.04, which states that a manual
23	reading of the turnstiles shall be performed and recorded at
24	the end of each gaming excursion to provide turnstile readings
25	and verify the turnstiles are operating properly.

In this matter, on September 9, 2022, a casino employee failed to take the turnstile meter readings at 10:00 AM for the 8:00 AM cruise. An email from Revenue Audit indicated that September 9, 2022, the date of that failure, was the first date that the recording of the turnstile meter readings would be shared between Caesar's Rewards Center and security personnel.

Subsequently, there were nine additional instances of failed turnstile meter readings through January 23, 2023, which required the casino's surveillance department to conduct reviews for the purpose of reconciling the number of patrons on the casino floor at the end of each two-hour cruise and ensure that admission taxes were paid appropriately.

The Disciplinary Review Board recommended a \$10,000 fine which the casino contested and requested to be removed or reduced to a minimum fine based on the measures taken by the casino to address the violations. Such measures as outlined in the casino's response letter included email reminders from casino management, calendar reminders to attendants, and further training to employees.

The Disciplinary Review Board considered the casino's response and has decided to retain the recommendation of a \$10,000 fine in this matter. And I'd be happy to answer any questions that you might have.

2	is an American multi-national investment company, and they are
3	considered to be the largest asset manager in the world.
4	BlackRock provides investment management services to
5	institutional clients and to retail investors through various
6	investment vehicles. BlackRock is publicly traded on the New
7	York Stock Exchange.
8	They have approximately 9.09 trillion assets under
9	management. BlackRock is not currently registered as an
LO	investment advisor with the SEC, although they have five
L1	subsidiaries that are registered investment advisors with the
L2	SEC.
L3	They own 5.04 percent stock in Konami Group
L4	Corporation, who is a supplier key business entity. They hold
L5	a waiver for their ownership in multiple Missouri licensees.
L6	I'd be happy to answer any questions you may have.
L7	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: My only question is they currently
L8	own 5.04 percent?
L9	MS. WIEBERG: Uh-huh.
20	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: And request for waiver is from 10
21	to 20? Am I reading that correctly?

I'm Melissa Stephens, I'm an Internal Control Auditor with the Commission. 8 9 Under Tab N we have a group of five proposed rule amendments that were identified during the Gaming Commission's 10 recent periodic review of all rules contained in 11 CSR 45. 11 12 These proposed amendments address various cleanup items, 13 including the ongoing updates to the class designations as 14 needed to correctly identify the licensee that is intended to 15 be referenced in the rule. These updates are necessary due to 16 another regulation that was previously amended which changed 17 the Class A license to a Class B license, and it created a new 18 Class A license. 19 Additionally, these amendments update terminology for 20 consistency with the statues as well as throughout 11 CSR 45, 21 such as replacing the term "riverboat" with the term 22 "excursion gambling boat," which is the term that is defined 23 in statute and that now also encompasses a non-floating 24 facility that is licensed by Commission. 25 Also addressed in these amendments are typographical

corrections for consistency with other regulations and the removal of duplicative and outdated elements as well as the revision of the purpose statement or the title as needed for consistency with the rule.

In addition to the cleanup items just described, these proposed amendments also include additional revisions that have been requested by staff and industry, generally to clarify the regulations. We sent the drafts of these proposed amendments out to industry for their review and have addressed the comments that they provided regarding these proposed amendments.

The first item on N1 is the proposed amendment to Rule 5.030 which also revises Sections 1 and 2 for clarity. Per the feedback that we received from industry during their review of the drafted amendment, Section 1 was further revised to clarify that the prohibition is limited to properties that are owned or operated in Missouri.

The amendment to 5.100 also clarifies and updates the specifications for the chips that are used at the table games.

Rule 5.140 is being amended to update the requirements for the location where the reserve and the secondary chips are stored to provide additional options. This amendment adds the main bank as a storage location for reserve chips as well as allows the Class B licensee to store secondary chips in the main bank or in the cashier's cage if they prefer.

The amendment to Rule 5.150 clarifies and updates the storage and inventory requirements for chips.

Finally, the amendment to Rule 5.235 updates the terminology due to changes in technology and for consistency with the terms that are used in other regulations to refer to independent testing laboratories or ITLs.

This amendment also removes outdated language which states the Commission would select the independent testing laboratory and would bill the Class A licensees for the costs for transportation of analysis of the electronic gaming devices.

We received approval from the Governor's office to proceed with these amendments on August 14 of 2023. If you approve them today, the 30-day public comment period would begin when the proposed amendments are published in the Missouri Register on October 2, 2023. The public hearing is anticipated to be held on November 2, 2023, and the rules will come back to you, along with any comments or suggested changes, for the Final Orders of Rulemaking at your December 6, 2023 meeting. If you approve the amendments at that time, these amendments would become effective on March 30 of 2024.

25	regulations of other agencies address that childcare

1	facilities are properly licensed and regulated for health and
2	safety.
3	This rescission was proposed at the April 26, 2023
4	meeting, and you approved moving forward with the proposed
5	rescission. The public comment period ended on July 1, 2023,
6	and there was a public hearing on July 6 of 2023. No public
7	comments or testimony were received regarding this proposed
8	rescission.
9	On August 14 of 2023, we received approval from the
LO	Governor's office to proceed with this final order. Pending
L1	your approval, this rescission would become effective on
L2	December 30 of this year.
