2	We do have three team members to recognize this morning.
3	First up we have Meghan Dowell. Meghan joined the MGC in
4	December of 2014 and serves as an Audit Supervisor. Meghan's
5	co-workers and managers describe her as a dedicated employee
6	who has embraced her supervisory role.
7	Meghan leads the team by example and continuously
8	strives to help everyone around her. She is thoughtful,
9	knowledgeable, and detail-oriented, which makes her not only a
10	great auditor, but a great teammate and leader.

12	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Next we have Consideration of
13	Hearing Officer Recommendation for Shelly Weaks, Resolution
14	25-001. Mr. Tom Snider was the hearing officer. Sir, you
15	have the floor.
16	MR. SNIDER: Good morning. This is the first time I've
17	done this. Good morning. I did have the opportunity to
18	preside as the hearing officer over a matter involving a
19	proposed suspension of Shelly Weaks' Level II license, I
20	believe.
21	Upon consideration of the evidence, it was clear that,
22	even by admission, Ms. Weaks was made aware of some improper
23	treatment of sensitive keys. They were she admitted that
24	she was aware that they were being secured in a non-secure
25	fashion to a (inaudible) without the use of a secure fob.

1	And after the testimony and the presentation by the
2	Gaming Commission's counsel, I recommend that the suspension
3	be upheld.
4	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Are there any questions for Mr.
5	Snider? Thank you so much, Mr. Snider.
6	MR. SNIDER: Thank you.
7	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: I move to approve Resolution
8	25-001. Is there a second?
9	COMMISSIONER SPAULDING: Second.
10	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Any further discussion? Angie,
11	would you call the roll?
12	MR. VENNEMAN: I'm sorry to interrupt. I believe
13	Ms. Weaks is present today.
14	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Okay.
15	MR. VENNEMAN: I don't know if she would like the
16	opportunity to make a comment.
17	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Absolutely.
18	MS. WEAKS: Thank you.
19	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Ms. Weaks, if you would state your
20	name for the record, I'd appreciate it.
21	MS. WEAKS: Shelly Weaks. Prior to the rekey of slot
22	machines, Casey Burec, which is a Shift Manager of Security,
23	she was going down with to take a sensitive key ring,
24	remove an old getting ready to be an old obsolete key. So
25	during the rekey, there's two keys that run simultaneously to

take off the old locks and turn in the new locks.

She decided for herself, without my approval, that she would take the keys down to remove the soon-to-be non-sensitive key and she would add the new key, so she took a one-inch key ring and placed it on the outside of the secured key hub.

Unfortunately, I was not made aware until after the key was removed that she had actually put those on the outside of the key ring. In prior discussion, it was not a good idea, it's -- you know, I didn't approve it. She didn't tell me that she did it when she was downstairs in the radio room.

One thing is that she violated it, she knew that if she needed to go use the chain of command and go above me, she could have done so. She felt like I was violating Chapter B and the violation of key control.

So I've maintained my Level I license for the past 18 years without an incident across three different casinos in Missouri. Throughout my career, I have consistently adhered to the highest standards of security and integrity and ensuring the compliance of all gaming regulations and protocols.

The disciplinary action against my license is not reflective of my actions or intent, and I respectfully request the Commission to consider removing the sanction from my record. I remain committed to upholding the integrity and

1	security of all operations on my supervision. Thank you.
2	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Thanks, Ms. Weaks. Tom, did you
3	want to
4	MR. VENNEMAN: Commissioners, Tom Venneman, Deputy
5	General Counsel. We are not here today to relitigate the
6	facts of this case. We did this in the hearing. The MGC
7	maintains the position that Ms. Weaks is in a managerial role.
8	Based on her position, it's her responsibility to maintain
9	control of sensitive keys, and that responsibility fell
10	through the cracks in this particular instance, so we just ask
11	that the Commission adopt this resolution at this time.

8	Licensees and Key Business Entities. There are numerous
9	resolutions which we'll vote on separately after we hear from
10	a number of folks. So I'd like to invite the following people
11	up to the podium, and I'll let you all decide what order you
12	want to go in.
13	Scott Butera, CEO of Affinity; Donald Wren, GM of HGI-
14	St. Joseph, LLC; Ryan Lounsbury, GM of HGI-Mark Twain, LLC;
15	the Honorable Mayor John Josendale, City of St. Joseph; and
16	the Honorable Mayor Bob Corbin, City of La Grange. Welcome,
17	everyone.
18	MS. GRIFFIN: Good morning, Commissioners. Thank you
19	for the opportunity to present today. My name is Jennifer
20	Griffin. I'm with Lathrop GPM. I'm local counsel for the
21	Class A and B licensees, and I would like to introduce the
22	team to you this morning.
23	Scott Butera, CEO.
24	MR. BUTERA: Good morning.
25	MS. GRIFFIN: And we have Amy McCain, who is the Vice

President of Compliance, and we have Don Wren, who is the Vice President and General Manager of St. Jo Casino to my right.

And we have Ryan Lounsbury, who is the Vice President and General Manager of Mark Twain Casino. And I'll leave the other introductions to the rest of the team as they proceed with the presentation, and I believe Mr. Butera will be making that.

MR. BUTERA: Okay, thank you, Chairman Zimmerman and the Commission. It's a real honor to be here today. I've always enjoyed the State of Missouri. I've been here many times as a fan, as a traveler. I've done some business here early on in the banking community, but it's really, really exciting to hopefully become a member of the business community in this great, proud, historic state; so thank you for the opportunity.

I'll talk a little bit about what's happening at Affinity Interactive and the properties here in Missouri. About six months ago, our ownership through Z Capital Management realized that we had significant untapped opportunity at all of our properties and if they could only be managed better and reinvested in, there was a potential for growth, not only in its current state, but with maybe future developments, given some of the land holdings that we have.

So they inserted me as the Chief Executive Officer, really with the idea to be a little bit of an agent for growth

and an agent for change. And the first thing that we did is we went in and we made significant investments in our people. We brought on new positions of people with tremendous experience that really didn't exist at the company. We have a new head of Gaming that's invested significant time in improving our slot product, and both Ryan and Don will talk about some of the changes that have already been happening at their property.

We brought in new marketing people so we could better relate to the community and we could service our customers better and be much more experiential as opposed to being transactional. And that's starting to take place.

We've engaged quite a bit with our communities and, you know, I'm very proud to see that leadership both in the political arena and in the business communities for both St.

Jo and La Grange are here to support us and explain the relationships that we've been able to develop and would develop further as we proceed with our new plans.

So it's very exciting to be here, and I think what you'll see, not only from us today but hopefully the upcoming years, is something we can all be very proud of because I certainly want to serve this state very well because, as I mentioned, I've had great experiences here and if I can contribute in any way and give back in any way, it will bring me great joy.

So with that, I'll proceed with a short presentation. I believe you may know that Z Capital did purchase Affinity Interactive in 2017. We currently have seven casino properties; we have four in Nevada, Clark County, and we have three in the Midwest, including our two here in Missouri. We also have one in southern Iowa.

And then in 2021, something that's less familiar to people is we bought a company called Sports Information Group, which is really the *Daily Racing Form*. I actually ran the *Daily Racing Form* for about nine months before becoming the CEO of Affinity. And what it is is it's really a media company, but it's the most authoritative — it's the authoritative entity for Thoroughbred horse racing. We provide all of the programs that you'll see at various Thoroughbred tracks as well as a great interactive experience for people that enjoy handicapping and betting on horse racing, so that's another part of our entity, as a little lesson.

Myself, I've been in the gaming business for about 30 years. I originally started as a banker. Actually, one of my assignments when I was a banker in real estate was to value and sell off Country Club Plaza in Kansas City, so that's when I first got to know Missouri really well, a beautiful place, by the way. I spent about six months here in Missouri doing that.

But after banking, I got involved in gaming in 2021, always with the idea of improving companies, turning them around, helping them grow. I got my first start in Atlantic City for Trump Entertainment, which was Donald Trump's gaming and real estate enterprise, we did a big turnaround of that company in the early 2000s, and then very successfully when I was in a similar deal for Tropicana Resorts. I was at Foxwoods in Connecticut which is still today I think one of the largest resorts in North America, about seven million square feet, and it deals with Cosmopolitan.

And I also spent time in media. I worked for a streaming company called FuboTV, which has now done a deal with Disney. I was the commissioner of the Arena Football League for a period of time. So as you can see, I'm old, but I have a lot of good experience and hopefully can help bring some of that skill base here.

Some of the people who are not here today but are part of our team, again a lot of new people that have a lot of experience. Halise Uysal is our Chief Financial Officer. She comes to us from California Gaming. Charles Paelinck is a long-time Information Technology Professional, worked at places like Caesars and Stations, not only -- one of the few people I know on the info tech side that is also very astute in business and marketing. Chantelle Mark handles a lot of our human resource matters, and she's somebody who's very

involved in our personnel here in Missouri, as you can imagine.

And then to mention, you know, Z Capital, which is run by James Zenni. James is a very prominent investor that's been involved in gaming almost as long as I have and is very supportive of the company, not only financially, but in some of the day-to-day activities and is certainly supportive of the initiatives that we're taking on.

I think I mentioned our portfolio, and I don't think we need to go through that. As you can see, we are a company of substance. A little hard to read there, but we have -- let me pull up my own stats here. As I mentioned, we have just under 3,000 slot machines, 13 table games, 16 hybrid games across our portfolio, just over -- just under 250,000 square feet of gaming space. We have 2,500 hotel rooms and 1,200 employees.

If you look at our total, I think I mentioned some of this, but just to highlight Missouri, where we do have over 35,000 square feet of gaming space, over 800 slots, many of which are being replaced and are going to be brand new. And importantly, we have 70 acres of land, which can be used either by ourselves or with third parties, hopefully to develop additional amenities that can support our community and our facilities as well.

Over the last four years, we've paid just under 85 million in taxes which we're proud of. And again, the

Missouri property in terms of capital investments, a little over 17 million over four years, the company's invested a hundred million, and I would expect that -- I would expect that to grow as we continue to improve all of our properties.

So again, very, very happy to be here. I think, you know, we have a bright future here in Missouri. We are a company of growth. Should the opportunity present itself to make additional investments here, we would look to do that. We've had great success here, and I think with our new team, our new approach and the investments we're making and the support that we have from our community, we'll be very successful.

We're in really two exciting places. St. Joe has tremendous history. I had an opportunity several times to tour the community. It's an incredible place, a place one would strive to live and want to be a part of, and La Grange is making great strides as well, as Ryan will discuss.

So with that, I'll turn it over to Ryan, and again, I appreciate your time and consideration.

MR. LOUNSBURY: Thank you very much for allowing us to present today. Good morning as well.

The Mark Twain Casino's been here since 2001, and it's had a long history here within the State of Missouri. Our particular community, while it is small, we do pull from three different markets basically, Adams County in Illinois, of

course the eastern Missouri area and the south of Iowa as well, too, so we pull down from that area.

You know, the property, while be it small, certainly is a lot of fun. We've done a lot of work over the last -- since 2021 and actually (inaudible) too to really change what the facility looks like, what the interaction is. We've had great support from our community leaders like Bob and our city administrator and chief of police and so on.

As we continue to push forward, our main focuses at the property is to provide a fun entertainment experience for our customers, make sure that while they're here, you know, they're able to enjoy themselves, feel like they are in a safe and clean environment as well, too. You know, that's really been a focus of mine while I've been at the property.

I've officially been here one year now, was licensed officially in August, and I appreciate you guys for the consideration for that as well, too.

You know, outside of maintaining the facility and making sure that we're providing a great product for our customers, we're doing the same for our team members as well, too; so our goal being to hire good staff, provide a place where they can grow and also contribute to our community.

Community contribution is extremely important to me, and coming to the property, we put a lot of initiatives together that have allowed us to help engage our customers,

our team members, and grow the community as well, too.

So, you know, and then the big piece that I found was extremely important at this property was to create a culture of accountability at the property. You know, it's really important to focus on what we have to do as a business, you know, following policy procedure and then of course what we need to do from a Missouri perspective, following the CSRs, the MICS, the ICs, and so we put a lot of effort into that over this last year to make sure that our team members are prepared and know what they need to do and make sure that they follow the rules and the regs that are appropriate, to those particular areas.

From a property perspective, you know, we've (inaudible) since 2021 with 7.3 million into it. Mr. Mike Leara has been able to come over and see our facility shortly after he started. And even to his admission, he's like, It's a different place. And it really is.

The interior over the last few years has been completely redone, the restaurants have been redone, slot floor had new carpeting, redesign. You know, it's just very different than what it once was.

This year we accomplished a lot from the exterior perspective. We've repainted the outside, re-vinyl on the outside, replacing lights, you know, completely going through the parking lot, refinishing it. It really is a different

experience than what it was previously.

Here are some pictures from the old floor through the construction and then some from the new facility is right here, so just this last year we were able to put 63 new slot machines on the casino floor. That was one of our challenges, was the product that we had on the floor. Those 63 machines have gone in, they have seen great results.

On top of that, we've also invested on the leased side of our business as well for slot machines to bring in new product on the leased side as well, too. That's allowed our customers to have games that are fun and enjoyable and then keep up with what we need to do.

You know, obviously 2025 will bring more of that as well, too, because that again, to Scott's feedback about having a gaming person at our -- at our corporate level, giving us more opportunity to bring in additional games in 2025.

From an employee demographic perspective, we do get a lot of team members, you know, obviously from Missouri, which is great considering we're more of a rural casino. Our largest city around us is Quincy, Illinois, so we get about 40 percent of our applications out of that area. However, you know, as you can see from a standpoint of hiring, we're able to maintain and hire a lot of folks that are out of the Missouri area, which is fantastic.

So, you know, our next largest community to us Hannibal, which is about 30 minutes, and so the drive is certainly challenging for some if they decide to choose to come work for us, but our local small communities, La Grange, you know, Canton, Ewing, Palmyra, those types of places, we're able to pull staff out of those areas and help provide a good local experience for our customers.

And then from a vendor perspective, we'll get into the MBE/WBE details, but one of the things that we've really tried to push forward in 2024 is to focus on purchasing in Missouri as well, too. So purchasing in Missouri first and then obviously, you know, utilizing the opportunity to do MBE/WBE initiatives. You can see we've seen continued growth of the Missouri vendors that we've utilized.

Some of our MBE/WBE customers that we work with for our vendor perspective, all in, we're from a women-only business perspective, a little under 35 percent and a little over 5 percent for minority-owned businesses as well. So each of those continue to work forward, and the spend here is just through the third quarter, so there's actually more dollars spent as well, too, for 2024.

And like we talk about earlier, the community involvement is extremely important to me. One of the big things that we were able to accomplish this year in 2024, we actually utilized some of our marketing programming to help

engage our customers in helping us raise additional dollars for local community efforts here. And that goes through a promotion basically that says, Hey, come on in, donate to this particular charity, we'll offer you free slot play, so everybody kind of wins in the situation. All the money, we're just essentially passing it directly along to that particular charitable organization. Every single dollar goes to them.

And then we also have implemented TM ticket boxes around our floor as well, too, to acquire money there, and then just recently through our ATMs have instituted to where they can actually just donate their change if they so choose directly through the ATMs as well, too.

So all those dollars go directly to the charitable organizations, and we've had very -- many great moments just like these that you see on the screen within the community. And that's really been pushed out through making sure to let the people know that we're there and that we're here to support the community as well, too, and of course volunteer hours that we've been able to put in.

One of our HR efforts is to provide volunteer time off, which has been fantastic, so when team members volunteer their time, we're actually paying them for that opportunity to volunteer their time to help encourage them to do that.

And then of course we have little competitions as well, too, that we put in place so the more they volunteer, the more

opportunities they have to earn other additional prizes as well, so that's been a great effort for us as well.

Just the community-given dollars here, as you can see, 2024 was our strongest year in terms of community-given dollars as well as volunteer hours as well, and I continue to expect that to continue to grow in 2025.

For me, you know, I live in the community, I'm part of the community. Every casino I've ever worked at, it's been that way, and this has always been a focus of mine. You have to be a great community partner in order to ensure, you know, support the people that support your business.

Taxes, you guys pretty much know about those. I don't know if you want to go through numbers or anything of that nature. Probably not, I would imagine.

You know, team members, one thing I will point out here as far as staffing is concerned, you know, because we are a rural community and the majority of our population is 25-plus minutes away from us, it does make challenging times for hiring. And everybody, I think, is sort of facing that as well, too; but we're working through a lot of different efforts by social media posts and social media sponsored ads, doing things that help create an impact, you know, doing things within like say LinkedIn, for example, where I'm highlighting team members and what they're doing, you know, at our property, celebrating their wins, celebrating their

anniversaries. We've got a lot of Day One team members at our property, so that's pretty impressive, considering it's a 23-year-old property.

Again, just our local taxes paid, you can see the little elevated shot there of the property. That's with the new paint and everything that the exterior has received as well as the parking lot.

And one of the things that, you know, we talk about consistently is going to be our, you know, responsible gaming. This year in 2024 we installed Veridocs at our entry level so that way when customers come in we have actually, instead of just somebody making a decision on their own, there's actually a tool in place for them to make a decision if the individual is over the age of 21. With that system, we're actually able to upload our DAP system as well too so if somebody is a DAP, they get flagged and we're able to get them at the entry point, which is a great place to stop them versus, say, having to find them on the casino floor, of course.

You know, we continue to push through that. One of the big things that we've done as well to stay in compliance is initiate a checklist for each of our team members. When they join our team, they go through this checklist basically that talks through every single thing from policy procedure, CSR, MICS and ICs; and our HR team as well as our Compliance team member on property goes through that with each of those team

members.

Then we initiate a 30-60-90 basically temperature check with both our HR and Compliance with those individuals. This does two things. First, make sure that they truly do understand the rules and regs, and then on top of that, it also gives us an opportunity to temperature check how they're doing and hopefully keep those people with us longer. So basically if there is an issue, within 90 days typically you're going to know it, try to fix that problem before they try to depart the property since it's challenging to find staff where we're at at times.

Other than that, I don't have anything else unless you guys have any questions. I'd like to give an opportunity to our mayor to speak if that's okay.

CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: I do have a quick question, Mr. Lounsbury.

MR. LOUNSBURY: Certainly.

CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: I know in our report it talked about continuing to seek opportunities for the advancement of females and minorities and just wondered, you know, what you all might have been doing -- and for MBE vendors as well, just wondered if you had, you know, anything that you're working on to create those opportunities.

MR. LOUNSBURY: Yeah, absolutely. So one of the things I realized when I came to the property in January was that we

don't have a very good succession program in place, so one of the things I've gone through is trying to initiate that. So we've actually instituted multiple assistant manager roles that exist within the property, and that's allowed us to get some people in place from a secondary position to push them forward.

Most of our leadership team, from assistant managers and managers, are -- I think it's 50 -- a little over 50 percent, if not more, are female. And then from a minority perspective, it's a little more challenging because our community isn't as diverse as, say, maybe a St. Louis or a Kansas City, but we do have -- our assistant manager is minority for Food and Beverage, and then we also have another that is as well; and so between the two of them, you know, we're helping them grow so long term, hopefully they'll be able to fulfill those roles. My goal is always to promote from within, and if we can do that through developing these folks in these assistant positions and supervisory roles.

From a vendor perspective, you know, that's obviously something that we have to focus on. And from that perspective, we basically push forward any purchases that are done are actually going either from a local side or we're putting into our corporate purchasing. And corporate purchasing is high priority on minority as well as the women-owned businesses as well, too. And then like I said,

focus of Missouri-owned businesses as well because that's 1 2 important as well. MR. BUTERA: In addition to some of the senior management that I mentioned, Ryan did bring in new leadership 4 in Purchasing, and this is their highest priority. 5 6 CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Thanks so much. Thank you. Questions for Mr. Lounsbury? Okay, I'll let you pass it off 7 8 to whoever's next. 9 MR. LOUNSBURY: Thanks very much. Mayor Bob Corbin. 10 MR. CORBIN: I'm very pleased to be here today. This 11 is I think my third or fourth time here on this. Ryan has 12 come in here within the last year. As far as the city, myself 13 as the mayor of La Grange, I feel he's doing a wonderful job. 14 He's turned the casino around to where it looks like it's 15 completely different than it did three or four years ago. 16 I'm just here basically to say the city of La Grange is 17 here to back our casino because our casino backs us on a lot of different things. And he was talking about the money that 18 19 he's bringing, that they have raised for different -- the 20 Honor Flight. I'm a veteran. I was on the Honor Flight. 21 They just had a thing for the Lion's Club. I'm a Lion's 22 member. 23 So all of those things helps our community, and I think 24 Ryan is doing a super job. He's very friendly with everybody. 25 You go there, you see him out on the floor, very personal, and

I'm just here to back our casino. That's all I really have to say.

CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Well, we appreciate you being here because knowing that, you know, the leadership in La Grange, you know, is backing what Ryan is doing and backing the efforts of the casino, we appreciate you taking the time to be with us.

MR. CORBIN: Thank you all.

MR. LOUNSBURY: Mr. Don -- Don Wren, our GM of St. Jo.

MR. WREN: Good morning, everybody. It's so cool to be able to stand in front of you and talk. I've met so many of you over a period of time and had such great interaction, so it's really nice to be able to sit -- or stand here and talk about the positive things of such a great little property as St. Jo Frontier Casino.

It started in 1994 as a sailing vessel, and now a barge in its current location. It's been there since 1998. There's been a lot of changes. We've lived through a lot of things. The floods of 2011 and 2019, I'm sure everybody here will remember that have been here. I wasn't here. I got here right after it, although I do remember the threat we had last year. We were completely prepared to deal with that. Thank God, we didn't have to do it so, you know, I did miss out on some of the action.

But the things that are going on with St. Jo Frontier

Casino now are so exciting. I'm so proud to be a part of that for the last two and a half years. We've done so many really cool things. I've been in the industry over 40 years. I hate to say that, I age myself here a little bit, but I've been doing this more than 40 years across the country in some of the biggest entities in the gaming industry, and I'm so proud to be part of this group.

Since Scott came in and even before that, I think we were always heading in the right place, and now that Scott's at the head of things, things seem to be taking on a whole new direction, and it's exciting. And again, we're -- I'm really excited to be part of it.

I'm really excited to be part of that, not only in regard to working with the group that we work with at the casino -- we have a --

(INAUDIBLE)

MR. WREN: Sorry. But also being part of the community and being able to give back and be involved with the community as well. I have a couple of people that are going to speak here on our behalf when I'm done, and it's just been a great opportunity to be part of that.

We've invested quite a bit of money in the property over the last few years. We've put in 59 slot machines just in the last year. We -- like where I am, we will continue to invest in 2025 in new product, but also in leased product

moving forward to make the expectations of our guests be as competitive as we possibly can.

we've done repairs to the levee. After the 2019 flood, there was considerable investment in the levee to repair that to minimize any impact in the future. The high back system, we spent quite a bit of money on and will continue to do that.

The building, we started to take care of the outside just a little bit more. We've done the west side of the property. The rest of it's about to be done in 2025 as far as investment and keeping up the facility.

We've invested quite a bit in surveillance, making sure that, you know, we have a good eye on everything that's going on down there. We've worked with our local agents too, you know, to put some of the things together that we wanted to do from a surveillance standpoint.

Of course, like Ryan, the refresh and remodel was an exciting process for us. You can see what the building looked like before that. We had some pretty old, dated carpeting and it really needed a nice refresh; so we did that and had our grand reopening in 2024, in December of 2024.

And, you know, it's funny because that moment when we did that remodel and we did the reopening really gave me a good understanding of the collaboration between us and you. For some of you to come down and be part of that and actually do the interviews and the ribbon cutting, I thought was so

cool. And it really, really opened up a lot of our eyes to really what the possibilities are when groups work together.

So we're really proud about that and great to be able to stand in front of you and say that.

I think you have a good team. On a side note, you know, you've always been very professional with us. You know, one of the first people I ever dealt with was LeAnn, so it's fun to see her recognized. Going through that 71-page document I had to go through like everybody else, LeAnn was such a great help, never made me feel ridiculous. So I figured I'd mention that; it's just been a nice collaboration.

Our employee base, we roughly run about 155 employees.

Our minority makeup, makeup is about 18 percent. That's not just at the line level, that's at the leadership level as well. I think that's a good number. Our female population is 55 percent of that. You know, 92 percent of it is all Missouri. There's only 8 percent that's out of state, so I think that's a really good story for us, and I'm very proud of that.

The vendor statistics, you know, this is an interesting slide. If you look at 2021 and you look at where we're at from, you know, a vendor spend, Missouri vendor spend has really, you know, come up. That's flipped, you know, at 69 percent, so I think it's a good -- somewhat of a good story there.

Our MBE/WBE, like Ryan, we have a whole list of here. It's a good story. We've done a good -- I think we've done a good job. We've engaged quite a bit. One of the things that we do, at least on our property, if we need a new vendor, they have to go out and get at least three, you know, quotes and different vendor opportunities, and two of them have to be minority or women.

So we -- you know, we're working on not only doing that over at the property, but working with corporate to make sure that that's a process that we continue and we continue to build on those numbers.

The community involvement, as Ryan said, we're really proud of that. We've done a lot of really cool things. Those pictures that you see up there are just a fraction of the things that we're involved in with community and being able to give back. And that's some of the coolest things about being in the position that I'm in and being able to be part of that, being able to partner up with the community and John and the St. Joe Chamber of Commerce. It's just a really active group so they -- you know, that whole collaboration between the community and the community leaders I think is phenomenal at St. Joe.

Again, some of the charity and community volunteering; we didn't list all of the stuff there at the bottom of 2024, but again we're really proud of the impact that we have on the

community, and it's particularly impactful when you're out and you're giving one of those checks or you're out on the casino floor and you're at one of the events and somebody comes up to you and thanks you personally for the impact that we've made and the contributions that we've made on behalf of them. So it's really, really not only a great story, but it's a lot of fun.

Taxes and payroll, one of the things that you see there, the payroll continues to increase, you know, throughout the last year or so. Scott's been really good in making sure we are out there and we're competitive with our wages. We increased some of the areas, particularly in Security, quite a bit just in the last year and a half to just not only stay competitive, but also make sure that we get the right people in the right positions and especially with Security when we talk about, you know, responsible gaming.

MR. BUTERA: Again, just to help out, we do have a new leadership position as the Head of Security, 30-year veteran in casino security that's joining us, a position we never had before.

MR. WREN: So responsibility, as Ryan said, we're really excited to have the Veridocs process in place for us. It really helps. We've seen an influx of foreign documents coming in that we have to verify, and it makes it a lot easier for our employees to verify that. We take the responsible

gaming and under 21 very, very seriously. We have very few incidents.

We've made some significant changes. We also go through the same training process and expectations that Ryan does. It's a corporate initiative as far as the checklists and then making sure that, you know, people are not only educated, but we hold them accountable going forward.

So that's St. Jo. I talk really quick. If anybody's got any questions -- but before you do, I'd like to introduce two of the people that came up with me, John Josendale, our president -- or our mayor, rather. Sorry, sir. (Inaudible) stepped on our president.

MR. JOSENDALE: Yeah, I don't want to do that. Good morning, I'm John Josendale, mayor of St. Joe. A couple of quick things, and I am here to support St. Jo Frontier Casino and what they do for St. Joe.

Don talks a lot about what they've done, but what they've given back to the community has been real. I also had the opportunity that involved you all, as does the mayor of La Grange. We both sit on Home Dock, and that's an organization that supports the casinos and works within the state. So watching what other casinos do and talking with each other, I feel very fortunate to be able to sit here today and talk to you about what Don and the St. Jo Frontier Casino give back to St. Joe because they don't just give the casino, the gaming,

that, they give back to the community.

They've done -- with the reopening, they brought people back to the casino. They -- we have -- we have in St. Joe have developed a new trail system. They've keyed into that because it's kind of closely located where they are, so they're going out and reaching out. We're bringing in people from all over the country right now. We -- at any given weekend in their parking lot, you can see cars from six, seven states that come down. And they come to enjoy our park, but also come to the casino, so it's something that gives back to us that helps us draw people here.

And what Don does as far as, you know, he has events down at the casino that bring people down, get people involved. They just redid their ballroom which has been able to accommodate us in having some different meetings, so from our point of view, very much a community-oriented group. They really are part of us and where we're growing.

We do have a lot of ideas. We talk about the ideas all the time, which is a lot of fun, but it's a give-and-take, so we work together, and I think that's really positive.

With that, I'd like to turn it over to Brad Lau from the Chamber of Commerce.

MR. LAU: Good morning. I'm Brad Lau with the St.

Joseph Chamber of Commerce and St. Joseph Economic Development

Partnership. I'm pleased this morning to speak on behalf of

the St. Joseph Frontier Casino and the positive impact that they make in the community and the St. Joseph region.

Funding benefits that the community and many organizations, including Economic Development in St. Joseph received from the St. Joseph Frontier Casino, they have actually a revenue requirement that they provide the city and the county associated with the lease of the property that they're on on the river, and that allows the St. Joseph Economic Development Partnership to work with existing business and industry on expansions and locating new industry in St. Joseph to ensure a growing and vibrant economic base.

The funding also allows us to work with Workhorse Development efforts to ensure St. Joseph has a pipeline of skilled workers that are ready to fill our industry's needs. Without the contribution that's made through this gaming fund, our economic development efforts would be severely restricted.

And just as kind of a little stat, the St. Joseph Economic Development Partnership, which includes the city, the county, the St. Joseph businesses and including the St. Joseph Frontier Casino, over the last five calendar years, 2021 through 2024 have reported 681 protected new jobs and new capital investments in our primary industries of about 624 million dollars, so substantial investment in our community.

In addition to the economic development side St. Jo Frontier Casino provides, they also purchase over \$20,000 in

sponsorships to support community initiatives like Parkways on the Park, Parties on the Parkway, career fairs and other Workhorse Development initiatives.

And then their contributions go beyond the monetary investments. The casino allows their employees to be involved in the community. The casino employees are part of the Chamber's diplomat, which is a voluntary resource of volunteers that provides labor for community programs such as Parties on the Parkways, and the casino actually has five of their staff that are diplomats, including Don.

So these are just a few of the areas that the casino shows they, as Don showed on his PowerPoint, they support a number of other non-profit organizations in the community. So we certainly appreciate everything St. Jo Frontier Casino does for St. Joseph.

MR. WREN: Thank you so much. Any questions?

MR. BUTERA: Actually, just in conclusion, one, thank you, thank you so much members of the community, for supporting us. I know we had a chance to talk a lot about all the things that we're doing at the property, the product and everything, but one thing I'd like to leave you with is that it's really, in my 30 years of gaming experience, it's never really about the building, it's always about the people.

And one of the things I think we did not do a good job of historically is investing in our people and creating an

environment where they could grow and have a rewarding experience and be part of something special that would translate to our customers.

And that is the number one focus across the board.

That's why we are increasing wages, that's why we are changing the way we incentivise people, that's why we are changing the way that we train people to interact and in recruiting, training and rewarding and creating, you know, a warm environment where people want to come to work, they're proud to be part of the community of gaming.

we're an employer of choice where people say, I can go through and have a great career or I can use it as a stepping stone and do something else and learn a great deal from some amazing people and have interaction with the community. Those are -- those are the things that are of highest importance.

And what I always say is we will treat anyone the way they treat our team, the way they treat our company. If you come into our company and you come into our team and you're respectful and you work hard and you try every day, you're going to have a great experience. If you're somebody that feels less passionate, we'll help find a place for you that you can find that passion.

But that's really what we're about and hopefully that helps us succeed. But thank you so much for your time.

CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Thank you so much.

MR. BUTERA: With that, we'll take questions.

CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Any questions for the folks from Affinity or their GMs or their Honors from La Grange or St. Joe? All right, thank you, gentlemen.

MR. BUTERA: Thank you so much.

CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Seeing none, we'll move on to public comments, and I'd invite anyone from the public to step up to the podium, state your name for the record, and keep your comments to less than five minutes.

All right, seeing none, next I'll ask Sergeant Sammy
Seaton to come forward and provide the investigatory summaries
for the properties.

SERGEANT SEATON: Chairman Zimmerman and Commissioners, good morning. Five inter-related companies, including Affinity Interactive, its two Missouri operating companies and two of its parent companies, have submitted applications seeking renewal of their respective Missouri gaming licenses which are all set to expire on January 31, 2025.

Affinity Interactive based in Las Vegas, Nevada, is a gaming company which owns and operates seven casinos in three states. In Missouri, Affinity Interactive is a holder of a Class A Riverboat Gaming License. Two of its 100 percent wholly owned riverboat gaming operations are HGI-St. Jo, LLC, doing business as St. Jo Frontier Casino located in St. Joseph, Missouri, and HGI-Mark Twain, LLC doing business as

Mark Twain Casino located in La Grange, Missouri.

St. Jo Frontier Casino and Mark Twain Casino each hold a Class B Riverboat Gaming License. Two of Affinity's parent companies, Affinity Gaming Owner, LLC and Z Capital Group, LLC are holding companies within privately held Z Capital Group of companies.

Affinity Gaming Owner is the 100 percent owner of
Affinity Interactive. Z Capital Group is the indirect owner
of Affinity Gaming Owner, Affinity Interactive St. Jo Frontier
Casino and Mark Twain Casino.

Affinity Gaming Owner and Z Capital Group are each holders of a Missouri Riverboat Key Business Entity License.

Missouri State Highway Patrol Investigators and MGC Financial Analysts conducted individual licensing renewal investigations on each of the afore-mentioned applicants, and these investigations included, but were not limited to, financial reviews, inquiries with local, county, and state officials, out-of-state gaming agency jurisdictional inquiries, a review of disciplinary actions, litigation, business credit profiles, and a review of the key persons associated with each company.

The investigative summary reports were provided to the MGC Staff for their review, and I would be happy to answer any questions you might have.

CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: I actually have several questions.

1	And I may be all over the map, Sergeant Seaton so, you know,
2	jumping from questions about Affinity to both of the
3	individual properties. Just to make sure that I understand,
4	in 2016 z Capital Partners went from owning 41.14 percent of
5	Affinity to acquiring all Affinity shares. Is that my
6	understanding?
7	SERGEANT SEATON: I believe so, yes, ma'am.
8	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Am I understanding that correctly?
9	And I know that they were incorporated in Delaware in 2015.
10	Is that their base of operation, in Delaware?
11	SERGEANT SEATON: Are you referring to Affinity or
12	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: I think Z Capital Partners.
13	SERGEANT SEATON: They're in New York City.
14	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: In New York City.
15	SERGEANT SEATON: Yes.
16	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Okay. And then I know that James
17	Zenni, Junior has been continuously licensed with the MGC
18	since 2012. When will he come up for renewal? Do we know?
19	MS. McCARTHY: It would be September 30 of 2026.
20	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Okay. So he's still got a couple
21	of years on his current license, okay. Thank you. And then
22	this may be this next question may be for Jenny Hemmel when
23	she comes up to talk about the MBE/WBE compliance, but I
24	recognize that not all of the 2024 figures were included
25	because the fourth quarter was not available yet, but in those

1 MBE expenditures in St. Joseph, I wondered if there was an 2 explanation for the significant drop from 180,000 to 64,000 at 3 the end of September. I know that they went through a pretty significant 4 renovation because I got to be there for the ribbon cutting, 5 but wondered if maybe that was a reason for the dropoff. 6 7 again, that may be something that Jenny will address. 8 Do you want me to address it now? MS. HEMMEL: 9 CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: I know you're going to come up and 10 give a report, so just a -- like I said, I apologize for kind 11 of being all over the map. 12 And then I did have the opportunity to ask Commissioner 13 Conway about the bridge construction and its negative impact on, you know, the amount of traffic that's able to get to 14 15 the -- any end in sight on the bridge construction? 16 MR. We're looking for a February-March completion 23 on that. They've got one side of it done. Hopefully we can 24 get the other motivated to get it completed. 25 CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: February-March would be nice. I

2	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: State your name again, please.
3	MR. WREN: Don Wren, Vice President and General
4	Manager. Yes, and it really was a result of the expansion and
5	the money that we were spending on the remodel that kind of
6	offset that. And where it looks like we're at, we'll work on
7	that diligently in 2025 for sure.
8	CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: Thank you so much. Any other
9	questions for Ms. Hemmel? Thank you. Thank you, Jenny.

Investigative findings were provided to the MGC Staff for their review, and I would be happy to answer any questions you might have.

Missouri State Highway Patrol Investigators and Missouri Gaming Commission Financial Analysts conducted relicensing investigations which consisted of a financial review, jurisdictional inquiries, a review of disciplinary actions, litigations, and the key people associated with the company.

The findings of these investigations were provided to the Missouri Gaming Commission Staff, and I would be glad to answer any questions you might have. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN ZIMMERMAN: I do have a question. The investigation revealed that there are six intermediary holding companies that are not licensed with the State of Missouri; is that my understanding, and if the acquisition by Brightstar does not proceed, will the MGC -- will we be seeking -- will we be asking those companies to submit applications if that acquisition doesn't happen? Because I know that the report said that if the acquisition -- if the acquisition does -- I'm probably not saying it right -- if the acquisition does proceed, will we be seeking licensure from those subsidiary companies of Brightstar Capital Partners?

DIRECTOR LEARA: I think best to answer that question may be on the hot seat again, LeAnn, do you have some
